the nose.

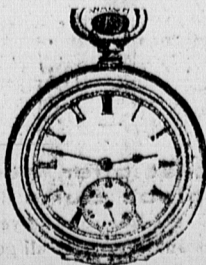
The men's meeting at the Y. M. C.

seventy five to one dollar per pair
and chickens seventy five to one dol-
lar.

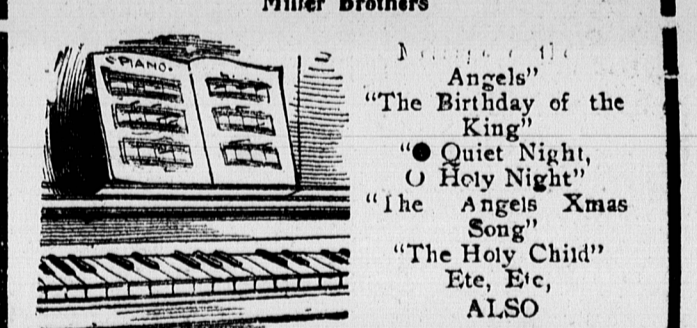
