At the meeting of the Temperance Alliance yesterday Rev. E. Tennyson Smith was present towards the close of the proceedings. From the point of view of an expert in temperance he congratulated the Alliance on the work accomplished by them and referred with pride to the high position which his province occupies in the regard of the English-speaking race with respect to its position regarding prohibition.

On March 4th the residence of Dr. and Mrs. Toombs, Mount Stewart, was the scene of a very enjoyable parlor social, under the auspices of the Mount Stewart Methodist church. After a hearty participation in dainty luxuries kindly provided by the ladies, a collection was taken from the gentlemen present, which amounted to the pleasing sum of \$17. A hearty vote of thanks was proposed by the pastor to Dr. and Mrs. Toombs for the use of their commodious home and to all who had assisted in making the social a success.

VERY little that is new is to be added to the information already possessed regarding the condition of affairs in Auburn and Dromore, where varioloid has occurred. Under the direction of the Local Government the boards of health in the districts where the disease is reported to exist are flagging all homes which contain patients, and the inmates of infected houses will be carefully quarantined so that all danger of carrying the infection further abroad may be provided against. All persons in the infected districts and the neighboring settlements will be vaccinated as quickly as possible, this being a certain safeguard, and the carrying out of which will remove all cause of fear. The Board of Health throughout the Island are being re-organized, and vaccination will be the order of the day. The report of the city doctors who went to investigate the disease in several houses where there were patients, was to the effect that it was the mildest form of varioloid. It is however contagious, and no precaution should be overlooked in trying to banish it from the community.

J. F. ROBERTSON, B. Sc., has resigned his position as lecturer in the Faculty of Science of the McGill University. Mr. Robertson is a native of Charlottetown and a graduate of Prince of Wales College. He supplied as professor of mathematics in P. V. C. for one year.

REV. E. TENNYSON SMITH'S third meeting at the Market Hall last evening was the largest of the series and the interest grows nightly. Rev. Mr. Ross presided and gave a brief introductory address. Rescued the Perishing, and a Better Day is Coming were sung and Rev. Wm. Dobson offered prayer. Then the lecturer came forward and expressed his regret that they could not hold a meeting for children owing to the danger of infection. He was glad, however, to see a number of boys and girls present and would make all his stories simple enough for them to understand. Later when some of the boys became inclined to talk he asked each of them to rise, fold his program, lay it on the chair and sit on it which they did. In the meantime he went on with the exposition of his theme for the night, the Great Struggle, illustrating it with a number of captivating stories which were excellently told. These were in some cases humorous, in other cases thrilling or pathetic. He easily moves his auditory to breathless interest, to side-splitting laughter and some to tears. He is perhaps a greater actor than orator, and with him the cause of temperance and prohibition is inseparably interwoven with religion. There was little violence of language than those who usually attend temperance meetings are familiar with. His stories are gathered from many lands—Birmingham, Liverpool, Wales, different states of the American union, Australia and Canada. There were stories of Carrie Nation, of John B. Gough and other temperance workers. One story of the redoubtable Carrie smashing a saloon which the proprietor had defiantly called the Carrie Nation Saloon was full of interest and was illustrated by large photographs showing the saloon before and after the operation. He prayed with Carrie before she went on this errand and gave her some good counsel. He did not encourage smashing but was surprised there was not more of it. He was severe on druggists who illegally sell for beverage purposes and on doctors who prescribe other than for legitimate medical uses, characterizing them as worse than the saloon-keeper. It was well to take precautions to save the children from small-pox, but more important to save them from becoming bleary-eyed drunkards. He strongly commended our Prohibitory Law and would return to England to renew the battle there with renewed strength after visiting a prohibition province. He concluded with a most realistic presentation of a "rag" of war between the temperance and liquor forces. First he arrayed these forces, the temperance societies, the churches, the editors of the daily press of this city and others on the side of prohibition and the motley array of those interested in the liquor trade on the other. Then came the "tag" and it was indeed a long and hard pull as he first gained a few inches, or feet, and then lost ground again. At one time he gave it up in despair and sat down. Then he renewed his pull, called on the Sons of Temperance, the Temperance Union, David Small, Pastor Dobson, Pastor White, Pastor Lodge, Father Burke, and finally on "the church of the living God" to pull for their lives. Thereupon the tide of battle turned and everything went the prohibition way. There are no dull minutes with Tennyson Smith on the platform and at work. Many were impressed a second if ever before with the wickedness of the liquor trade, the misery it has caused and that prohibition is the best known remedy. Tonight the lecturer's subject will be up with the Drunkard and Down with the Saloon. A very large audience is expected. Some may not approve all Mr. Smith's method and language, but at least none will doubt his earnestness, sincerity and dramatic power. At any rate, those who heard him once will mostly think it worth while to go and hear him again.
