Shows Heart Of Man Dead For 110 Years

MONTRÉAL, April 26—McGill's oldest possession—the defective heart of a young man who died in 1823—held the centre of the stage at a meeting of the McGill Alumnae Society in the Medical Museum while addresses were given by Dr. Maude Abbott, curator of the museum, and internationally known authority on cardiac conditions and by Dr. W. W. Francis, medical librarian.

Dr. Abbott exhibited at the request of the Alumnae Society some of her many publications, among them the Sir William Osler Memorial volume and her "History of Medicine in the Province of Quebec," which commanded international interest upon its publication a year or two ago.

It was Dr. Abbott's contribution to medical knowledge—a clinical classification of different types of congenital heart disease—which led to the opening of the Medico-Chirurgical Society to women. Her paper on that subject was read by Dr. James Stewart to the society in November 1898, and inspired a resolution to admit women to membership, moved by Dr. J. G. Adams on that occasion and adopted with but one dissentient vote.

As the result of her work, Dr. Abbott was asked by Sir William Osler to write the section on congenital heart disease for his system of medicine. The exhibits of the McGill Medical Museum were classified by Dr. Abbott, according to the wishes of Dr. Wyatt Johnston, and at his suggestion she went to Washington in 1906 and put forward there before the medical convention his plan for forming an international society of medical curators, which was adopted. Dr. Abbott is the permanent international secretary of the International Association of Medical Museums.

New Invention Of Much Value

LONDON, April 25—(C.P.)—A device known as the "echometer," manufactured by the Marconi Sounding Device Company, gives the depth of water under a ship and the nature of the bed of the ocean, and will eventually, it is thought, be able to report the presence of particular kinds of fish in the neighborhood of the ship.

British trawlers are using this device more than other kinds of vessels at present, it being a comparatively new thing in the marine line.

It is claimed it is a valuable detector and that 50 per cent of the losses of vessels have hitherto been caused by strandings and kindred causes, many of which might have been avoided by the use of sounding apparatus capable of giving soundings instantaneously and in quick succession.

The device not only gives the depth of water under the ship, but indicates the nature (hard or soft) of the sea bottom, while recent experiments tend to show that the apparatus will eventually give information as to the presence of particular kinds of fish in the neighborhood of the trawler using it.

The apparatus is extremely simple in operation and can be manipulated by any member of the ship's crew. Soundings can be obtained instantaneously merely by pressing a button, and the presence of this gear on board ship undoubtedly encourages the taking of soundings frequently, even during the most adverse weather conditions.

INDIANS' BABES THRIVE IN WEST

WINNIPEG, April 26—(C.P.)—Papposes in the Dominion Government's baby clinics on Indian reservations throughout the west are showing the effects of the care bestowed upon them and the clinics are thriving, said Miss A. T. Brandon, investigating conditions on the reserves.

Special investigator for the Department of Indian Affairs, Miss Brandon is a pioneer in this phase of the Department's services. Assisted by four other nurses, she is attempting to ascertain the causes of the high mortality among infants and young children on the reserves.

Miss Brandon opened the first baby clinic of its kind in the Storey Indian reserve at Morely, Alta., in 1925. New clinics have been established in each of the three prairie provinces. Modern hygiene, she said, was combatting the death rate of children and the percentage of deaths was steadily being lowered.

Describing her work among the Indians, Miss Brandon said the clinics had been very successful and were overcoming the natural aversion of the squaws to sanitation and kindred matters. Now the Indian mothers readily put their children in care of the clinic's nurses and soon got accustomed to having their new-born paposes bathed and powdered, a new idea to them.
