FURTHER PARTICULARS OF MULLEN MURDER CASE

BOSTON, April 6.—Dionisios Spiropoulos, alias James Manter, a Greek, out 20 years of age, who was tured from Manchester, N. H., to be arrested in Boston yesterday, is the man who the police claim ended the life of the Cambridge domestic in Squire's field, Arlington, one year ago last Sunday night.

At midnight the police asserted that he was confessing on the verge of a complete confession. The latter is also now an accessory to the Cambridge police, as he states that he witnessed the killing of the unfortunate girl and helped to drag her into the field after Manter had knocked her down.

They were friends, and it was due to this friendship and the alleged fact that a solemn oath was administered to him by Manter on the night of the murder that, Delory states, silenced his tongue through all the months that the investigation into the case went on and on.

Delory, in fact, deserves no credit for what has already been learned by the authorities. Briefly stated, this is what transpired on the fatal night as Delory's lips last night related it.

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They "picked her up." Then they walked out to Arlington Centre. They turned and started back and dragged the girl into the deserted Squire field. Here Delory says that the murder took place. He alleges that Manter and himself carried the young woman to the edge of the delirium, where her body was afterwards found.
