GERMANY RECEIVED WITH OPEN ARMS

GENEVA, Sept. 10.—Germany has received into the League of Nations today amid scenes of European reconciliation which in their fire of enthusiasm have been unexampled since the armistice.

Germany and France, through Foreign Ministers Stresemann and Briand committed themselves to perpetual peace and solemnly engaged the honor of their nations henceforth never to draw the sword but to settle disputes by arbitration or compromise.

GENEVA, Sept. 10.—A feeling that loyal co-operation will keep Europe far from war and safe in the path of permanent peace and happiness continued tonight to be the dominating note of this memorable day when Germany was received into the League of Nations with the applause of thousands.

Dr. Gustav Stresemann the German foreign minister in a striking address before the assembly, prayed that the destiny of the League of Nations be fulfilled on the basis of its lofty conception of peace, freedom and unity, and Foreign Minister Briand of France, in moving language pledged the support of France in policies that would thrust war aside for ever.

The one outstanding feature of the day was the rather glumly manner with which both Dr. Stresemann and M. Briand approached the problem of disarmament, giving the impression that both statesmen realized that this is the most difficult problem of all confronting Europe.

PARIS, Sept. 10.—Almost at the same time that Germany was being welcomed into the League of Nations at Geneva by Foreign Minister Briand and other Allied statesmen, plans were announced today in Paris for economies which will bring about a reduction in the size of the French army.

PARIS, Sept. 10.—A ministerial council meeting at the Elysee Palace with plenipotentiaries, decided to reduce the number of army officers by 2,700, to cut the number of cadres (skeleton regiments) from 35,000, the 1914 figure, to 28,800, the 1904 figure, and immediately to reduce the cavalry ranks by 7,000 horses, and ultimately by 10,000, not counting the 2,000 Gendarmes mounts.

D. R. O. Confesses To Dishonesty

LAC LABICHE, Alta., Sept. 10.—Mr. Justice Clark, resuming today at Lac Labiche the inquiry under the Corrupt Practices Act alleging irregularities at polls in the Athabasca Riding in October, 1925, issued the first bench warrant of the indictment against the Federal Returning Officer at the Conklin poll, Coklin is at point on the Alberta and Great Waterways. It gave Cross 65 votes and Kellner L. Proctor, who is the Postmaster and store keeper at Conklin, was summoned to attend the inquiry at Lac Labiche on Monday last.

Yet another election officer has confessed to the stuffing of a ballot box in the case of W. Cross, the Liberal candidate, declared elected over D. F. Kellner, Progressive and Charles H. Gauverau, Conservative. R. W. Lacroix, poll clerk at the Own River poll, 25 miles north of Lac Labiche, stated that toward the close of the poll he and the Deputy Returning Officer, Julian Cardinal, decided that they would put in some ballots, marking them for Cross. About 18 or 20 people voted, said Lacroix, and he put in ballots showing a final vote of 33 votes for Cross and 1 for Gauverau.

A flat denial that P. D. Hamel, Mayor, Justice of the Peace and Postmaster at Lac Labiche, got ballots from him, marked them and put them in the ballot-box, was given by J. A. Simmoneau, Deputy Returning Officer at Lac Labiche, rural poll. Frank P. Fisher, who was poll clerk at this poll, stated that Hamel had come into the poll and demanded from Simmoneau, a ballot on behalf of one Besit, whom Hamel said he was representing.
