NEW YORK, Sept. 24 (AP) — World contract sugar quotations rose sharply today under the impetus of Cuban buying. The close was 4-6 points higher on a turnover of 34,350 tons.

Domestic sugar prices finished unchanged to 2 points higher on sales of 550 tons.

Market observers said indications were that most producers had sold their supplies available for export. No large raw sales have been reported recently, although some business has been done in export refined sugar.

MONTREAL, Sept. 24 (CP) — There were 231 cattle, 371 sheep and lambs, 231 hogs and 48 calves for sale on Montreal livestock markets today.

Steers were moving slowly and prices on all classes of livestock were about steady.

Steers ranged from \$5.50 for common kinds to \$9.75 for good steers. Heifers were \$4.50 to \$6. Butcher cows were \$4.50 to \$7, tops \$7.25. Medium cows made \$5.50 to \$6.25. Canners and cutters \$3. to \$4.25. Good bulls mostly \$6 to \$6.50 one top at \$7.25 and common bulls \$4.50 to \$5.50.

Veal calves were \$9. to \$13. Drinkers \$6.50 to \$8.50 and grassers were \$5 to \$5.25 mostly \$5.75 to \$6.

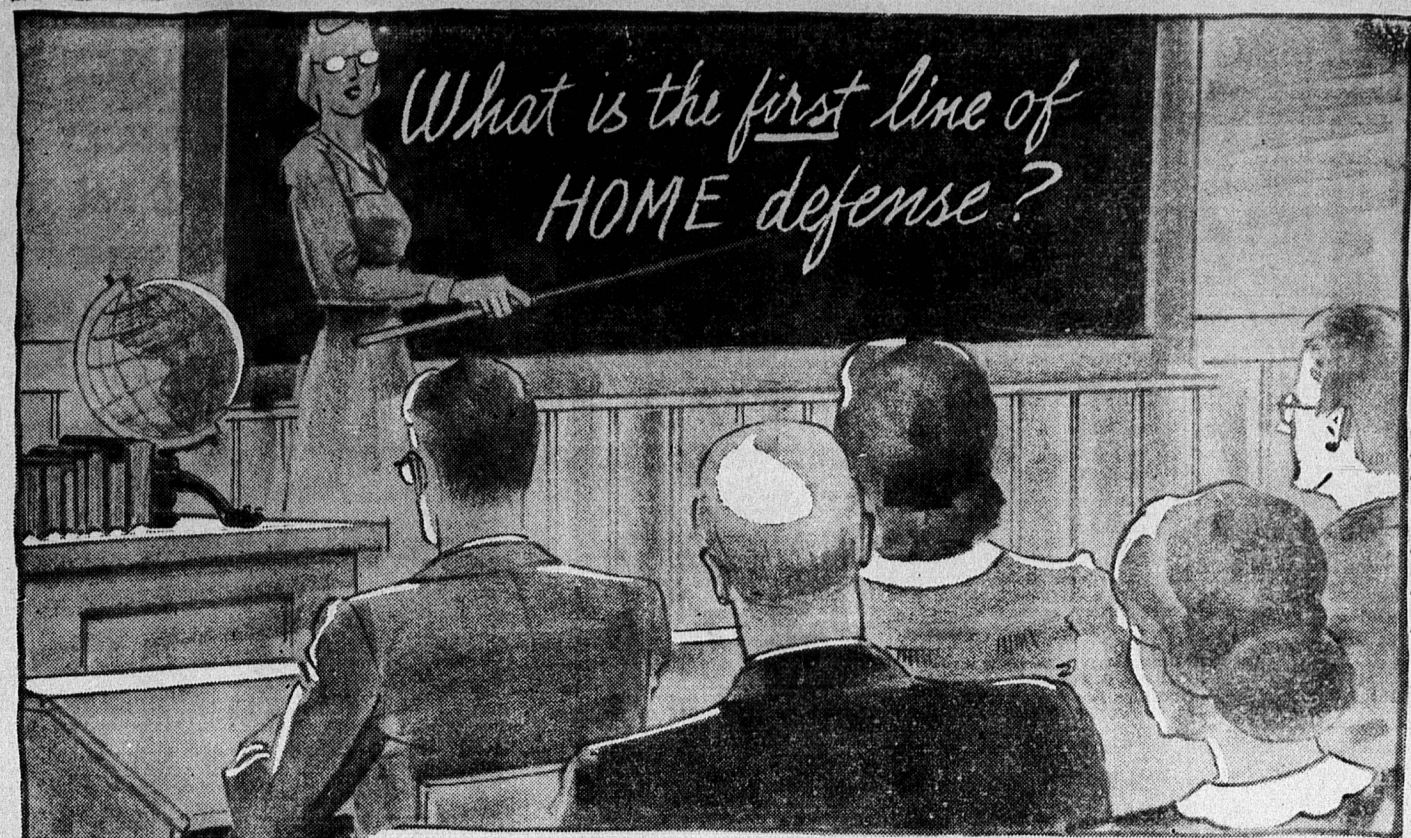
Good ewes and wethers made \$10.50 to \$11.50. Buck lambs and culls were discounted \$2 per hundredweight. Sheep were \$3.50 to
