GO AS GUESTS OF THE BRITISHERS

OTTAWA, March 21.—The statement in certain Conservative newspapers in Ottawa, Toronto, and Montreal, to the effect that "some misapprehension has arisen with respect to a supposed invitation to attend the coronation," is such an absolute travesty of the facts that it may be just as well to state the truth, says the Free Press.

Last July a committee of the members of the two British houses of parliament was formed with the object of inviting a certain number of members of the parliaments of the overseas dominions to visit Great Britain, as the guests of the British parliament, during the period covering the coronation of His Majesty King George. The dissolution of the British parliament last November interrupted the work of that committee, but since the election of the new parliament of Great Britain and Ireland, the idea having received the approval of the lord chancellor, the speaker of the commons, the prime minister, the leader of the opposition and the colonial secretary, the joint committee of the two houses at Westminster has issued invitations to 58 members of the "parliaments beyond the seas," in the proportion of 18 from Canada, 18 from Australia, 12 from South Africa, 8 from New Zealand, and 2 from Newfound-

land. It was never stated in any way officially, that these gentlemen would be the guests of the British government. What is more significant, they will be the guests of the British parliament; and the men who have been chosen from the Canadian parliament, at all events, appreciate the honor very much more than if they had been merely the guests of the British government. The members of the parliamentary delegations (whose expenses across the sea and back will be paid by their respective governments) will be the guests of the two houses of the British parliament from the date of their arrival in London on June 17. They will be accommodated at the Waldorf hotel in London as the guests of both houses of the British parliament until July 1, after which they will be taken on a tour of the United Kingdom and Ireland, also as guests of the British parliament.

To assert that such a committee as that which is presided over by the Earl of Rosebery, and has as its vice-chairman the Rt. Hon. James Lowther, Speaker of the House of Commons, is a "self-constituted committee," and to add that "there will be no official representation of the Canadian parliament," is to state

what is contrary to the facts. The 18 members of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada who will go to London in June will go as the guest of the British parliament as a whole and not as those of any "self-constituted committee."

A FATAL DISASTER IN PITTSBURG MINE.

PITTSBURG, March 23.—Nine men were instantly killed yesterday, in the Hazel mine of the Pittsburgh and Buffalo Coal Co., at East Cannonsburg.

They were being taken to their rooms in a remote part of the mine when a mass of loose slate in the roof fell, filling one car in which there were ten men.

The motor was stopped and other workmen on the train hastened to the assistance of the unfortunates. The death dealing slate was quickly cleared away and the bodies recovered.

OBITUARY.

Those who had the pleasure of her acquaintance unite in deserved praise of her Christian courage and patience during her illness and her many virtues in daily life. As a woman of striking personality, combined with a gentle, loving disposition, her friends will ever cherish her memory. A silent mark of respect was evidenced by the large concourse of teams that followed the remains to Canoe Cove Cemetery, where all that was mortal of a good and pious Christian was laid to rest to await the final resurrection. She leaves to mourn a sorrowing mother, a husband and six children, the eldest of whom, Samuel, is in British Columbia, also one sister, Annie, at home, besides a wide circle of friends who sincerely sympathize with the bereaved in their loss. The services at the house were performed by Rev. D. MacLean, who paid a glowing tribute to the life of the deceased. A good woman and a kind mother, she will be greatly missed from the community where she has spent her short life.

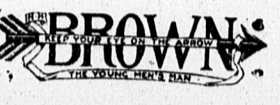

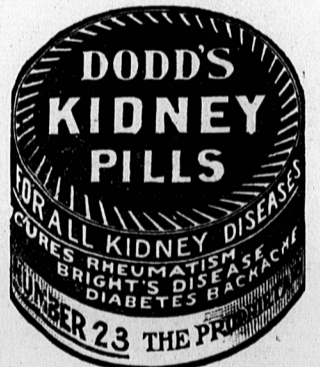

ROBLIN DISEASED WITH ONTARIO OFFER

WINNIPEG, Mar. 21.—There was a flutter of excitement in the galleries of the Legislature yesterday afternoon, when Premier Roblin laid on the table the offer of the Ottawa Government as to the terms of the Manitoba boundary extension. Anticipations of full dress debate were, however, disappointed for the Premier, after stating that the offer was a bitter disappointment to him, said that he would move a resolution on the subject, probably on Wednesday. The reply of the Ottawa Government took the form of a resolution of the Privy Council, endorsing the report of the Special Committee, consisting of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr. Fielding, which had had the matter under consideration. This report is of considerable length and reviews the various stages of the negotiations.

"That inasmuch as the said province will not have the public lands, mines and minerals and royalties incident thereto in the added territory as a source of revenue, there shall be paid half-yearly in advance by Canada to the province, in addition to any payments or allowances at present enjoyed an annual sum based on the population of such added territory as ascertained at each census thereof as follows: "The sum payable until the population of such added territory reaches 100,000, shall be \$200,000, thereafter until such population reaches 150,000, the sum will be \$250,000, and thereafter the sum shall be \$300,000.
