—NEW SILVER FOX RANCH.—Chas. T. Dunning and H. C. Timberlake shipped a truckload of silver foxes on Monday from the Rest Island fox farms to their own new modern ranch on the shores of Anderson Lake, a few miles from Minneapolis. The Tindum ranch, as is the name of the new place, will be under the management of Mr. Dunning, who has built up an enviable reputation among the fox raisers during the eleven years that he has been engaged in this industry, four of which were spent with the local fox company. Prior to 1919, Mr. Dunning had charge of the Boyers Mountain Silver Black Fox Company where he raised the foundation stock, descendants of which have won four grand championships at the National Silver Fox shows. Mr. Timberlake purchased two pairs of foxes of the prize winning strain from the Rest Island company early in 1922. Owing to the exceptional prolificacy of the original two pair, the natural increase has raised this number to fourteen pair, which augmented by the purchase of foxes direct from P. E. I. will comprise the foundation stock for this new ranch. After Mr. Dunning's resignation early this fall from the local company, he and Mr. Timberlake formed a partnership, Mr. Dunning assuming full charge of the operations of the ranch. Mr. Dunning and Mr. Timberlake have both expressed the wish that their Lake City friends go and inspect their new quarters the next time they drive up that way.

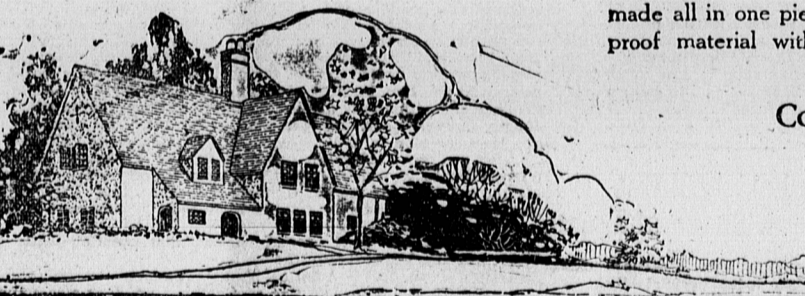

TINY PLANTS THAT HURT GLASS WINDOWS

(By Dominion News Service.) LONDON, Oct. 4.—More than 20 varieties of lichens attack and injure valuable stained glass windows of churches. Attention was recently called to changes in the windows at York Minster, the value of which is put at a fabulous sum, but it has been found that stained glass has many kinds of enemies. Dr. Ethel Mellor, in a communication to "Nature," says that stained and unstained glass is subject to the action of minute plants, but certain colors show more susceptibility than others. Purple, green, blue, red, amber and particularly amethyst glass corrode deeply. Grey tones are less affected, and golden yellow is more or less immune. Some lichens are so small as to be invisible to the naked eye, and can only be prevented by frequent brushing and washing or the application of a liquid mastic.
