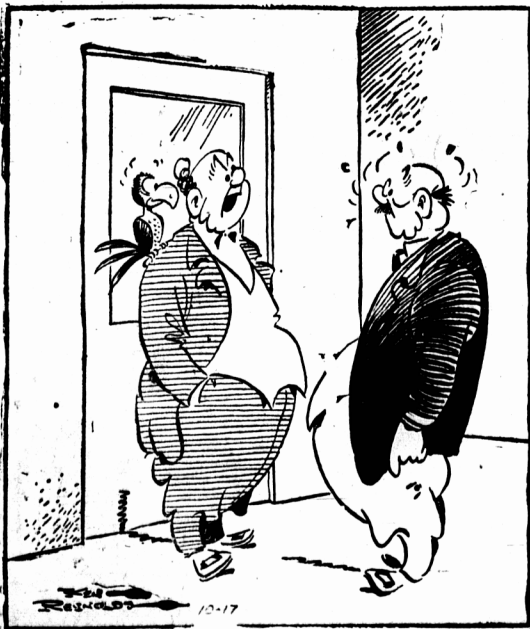

### Highlights In Crop Report

Below will be found a brief synopsis of telegraphic reports received at the head office of the Bank of Montreal from its branches.

The wheat crop of the Prairie Provinces will be below last year's production, but in excess of the long-time average. The second official estimate of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics places the Prairie wheat crop at 342,000,000 bushels, compared with an actual figure of 363,000,000 last year and a 1932-41 average of 321,000,000.

Average per acre yield by province is estimated at — Alberta 12.7 bushels, Saskatchewan 11.9 bushels and Manitoba 18.6 bushels, compared with the long-time average of 18, 15 and 16 bushels respectively.

Average down to wheat increased to 26,490,000, as against 23,045,000 in the preceding year. At the same time coarse grain acreage decreased to 14,017,000 from 15,582,000 and flaxseed acreage was down sharply to 304,000 from 1,810,000 last year.

Estimated total production in the Prairies of coarse grains and flax and yields per acre are as follows: with 1948 figures in brackets — oats 196,000,000 bushels, yield 27.0 (224,000,000 bushels, yield 29.7); barley 114,000,000 bushels, yield 25.3 (142,000,000 bushels, yield 23.3); rye 8,100,000 bushels, yield 7.8 (22,400,000 bushels, yield 11.4); flaxseed 2,100,000 bushels, yield 6.9 (16,800,000 bushels, yield 9.2).

Sugar beet acreage at 47,800 is up 9,100 acres from last year and production is expected to increase to 488,000 tons, compared with 404,500 tons last year.

The honey crop will be below the 1948 yield, an undetermined percentage as yet, following last year's near record production and a reduction in hives this spring.

The sunflower seed crop in Manitoba will yield 500,000 lbs. per acre from 55,000 acres.

In the Province of Quebec, owing to cool, wet weather, spring operations in many districts commenced somewhat later than in a normal year.

During June and early July, favourable weather conditions benefited crops generally and, notwithstanding the subsequent pro-

longed drought, which lasted until September, the overall crop yield in most areas is considered satisfactory.

### Hay Crop Light

The hay crop was above average and of good quality in the lower St. Lawrence and Lake St. John districts, but elsewhere the yield was below normal. Average grain crops have been harvested. Pastures were adversely affected in many districts by the drought of mid-summer, but recent rains have brought improvement and their condition is now fair to good. An average crop of peas was canned and tomatoes were below normal. Harvesting of potatoes and other roots is almost completed. The apple crop will be somewhat below average. Strawberries were below average in some areas, but other small fruits were plentiful. The maple syrup run was generally below average, but in most areas the quality was good.

Fall ploughing is under way in most districts. In Ontario, seeding and planting were completed in good time, except in certain eastern counties, where work on the land was delayed by frequent showers. Cool weather in May and early June, accompanied by night frosts and an extended period of drought, had an adverse effect on many crops. Widespread rains around mid-July and more favourable moisture conditions commencing in late summer benefited late-maturing fruits, field crops and vegetables and improved pastures.

Production of fall wheat, rye and spring grains was down from a year ago, but, with the exception of barley, total returns exceeded the ten-year average. Less than normal yields are expected from a sharply reduced acreage of buckwheat. Hay crops suffered severely from drought and the tonnage was light. Sugar beets and corn fared well, prospects for potatoes are about average, but turnips were poor. Harvesting of beans has been delayed by wet weather. Much of the canning tomato crop was of an inferior quality. Strawberries and raspberries were disappointing. Raspberries and cherries were down somewhat from a year ago, but apples, pears, peaches and plums yielded abundantly. A heavy crop of good quality flue-cured tobacco was stored.

### Maritime Provinces

In the Maritime Provinces, a comparatively mild winter was followed by ample spring rains and seeding and planting were about two weeks ahead of an average year. Excessively dry weather in mid-summer affected some districts and recent rains temporarily interfered with digging root crops, but, on the whole, conditions throughout the season were good. Grains, grown largely for local needs, developed well under favourable conditions and a good crop, equal to last year's, was garnered. The hay crop was harvested under excellent conditions, the yield was slightly better than average and there is some surplus. Except in low-lying lands, grass pastures generally suffered from the prolonged dry spell in mid-
