McKENNA SUGGESTS NEW BANKING PLAN LIKE U. S. SYSTEM

LONDON, Feb. 1. - Re-establishment of the Bank of England on a basis somewhat similar to the Federal Reserve Bank in the United States was suggested today by Reginald McKenna, former Chancellor of the Exchequer, in an address before the annual meeting of the London Joint City and Midland Bank, of which he is chairman.

Mr. McKenna advised that a thorough investigation be made by experts before any radical changes are made, but expressed the opinion that the Bank of England should take the initiative and risk a freer expansion of its credit facilities. The banker advocated a kind of inflation in the shape of greater facilities for bank improvement and obtaining bank credits.

Mr. McKenna's address seemed destined to revive the old controversy in England between the deflationists and inflationists. Britain's depressed trade and unemployment of the past two years being attributed by economists like John Maynard Keynes to deflation and over-hasty resumption of the gold standard.

SUGGESTED INCREASE OF TARIFF ON SHOES MEETING OPPOSITION

OTTAWA, Feb. 1. - The application of the Canadian Boot and Shoe Manufacturers for revision of the Customs tariff that will give them greater protection against imports from Great Britain and the United States, which is to be considered by the Advisory Board on Tariff Taxation next week, will be strongly opposed not only by Canadian interests, but also by representatives of British exporters.

It is understood that a strong argument will be presented by Toronto and Montreal representatives of the British Boot and Shoe Manufacturers' trade organization, while protesters will also come from parties representing the low-tariff sentiment in Western Canada.

Several recent applications to the Tariff Board, though not directed at British goods, have indirectly affected the British preferential tariff, which move in sympathy when revisions are made in the general tariff, and indications here point to the fact that British firms are beginning to take a greater interest in the work of the Canadian Tariff Board. Up to the present several applications for increases in the tariff have been considered by the board and no representations have been made on behalf of British interests.

Two important cases now before the board vitally affect British trade, namely, the applications respecting boots and shoes and woollens. Details concerning the latter are not yet available, and it is not known whether English and Scottish woollen firms are likely to register a protest.

SERIOUSLY ILL - Mr. Norman Ramsay Sr., Hamilton, is seriously ill with paralysis following a protracted illness which involved pneumonia. He delivered addresses at Halifax, Middleton, Bridgetown, Truro and Amherst. Previous to this he visited New Brunswick where he also spoke in several places.

MOISTURE IN THE INCUBATOR (Experimental Farms Note.) In the drier sections of Canada and especially where low temperatures prevail in early spring, great difficulty is experienced in getting good hatches, due to an insufficiency of moisture in the incubator room itself, poor results are still the rule and the percentage of chicks dead in shell is very great. It has been found that any considerable decrease from the normal moisture content of the machine causes the air to draw too much moisture from the egg with the result that the shell membrane becomes tough and dry and cannot be broken by the chicks at time of hatching. Under such circumstances it is essential that moisture be supplied liberally if a normal hatch is to be obtained.

By far the most important method of assuring a sufficient supply of moisture in incubation is that of supplying water by some method in the incubator itself. It is absolutely necessary in attempting to correct humidity in an incubator that some accurate method of recording the relative humidity of the machine be employed and the simplest method is that of a wet-bulb hygrometer. A relative humidity of from 50 per cent to 60 per cent has consistently given the best results on an Experimental Farm System. It is better to be on the side of too much than too little moisture.

One method in general use consists in placing water pans or trays of wet sand in the bottom of the incubator. Under ordinary circumstances sufficient moisture is supplied by this method. Experiments were carried on at Lethbridge and at the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, in which a wet-bulb was supplied by using pads made of thin boards wrapped to a thickness of about one inch, with cheese cloth or burlap, dipped in water and suspended above the eggs. The relative humidity was controlled by the frequency of moistening these pads. Since that below its capacity for absorption of moisture is greater, and the maximum amount of moisture should be supplied at that point. The slightly cooled and moist air around the pads slowly settles to the bottom of the machine and a fresh supply of hot air is constantly coming in contact with the pads. The eggs, being surrounded with moisture laden air, give up less of their moisture to the air and a more nearly normal hatch is the result.

At Lethbridge relative humidity in the incubator was increased from 39 per cent with moisture pans only, to 56 per cent with pads above the eggs and the percentage of eggs hatched from 42 per cent to 76 per cent respectively. H. S. Gatenbridge, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa.

MUSSOLINI TO PUNISH PROFANITY QUITE SEVERELY

ROME, Feb. 1. - Profanity will be a crime under the new penal code now being elaborated by Fascist jurists to replace and consolidate the previous codes. Although the penalty has not been announced, it will be heavy - from a large fine to several weeks or months in prison. This is in line with the puritanical reforming wave under Fascism which the Pope and the Vatican enthusiastically approve.

If the laws now being elaborated are obeyed, Italy will be the most moral country in Europe, without public dancing, drunkenness, idleness, profanity or any form of public immorality.

NOTES ON THE 9TH P. E. ISLAND EGG LAYING CONTEST FOR THE 12TH WEEK ENDING JAN. 23, 1927.

The Contest fell off 47 eggs during the past week. The total laid for the week being 538 and to date 4058.

The pens of Barred Rocks owned by J. L. Clark and Mrs. Milton Waye and the Experimental Station pen of White Leghorns No. 3 were the only pens in which every hen laid during the week.

Mr. Clifford McEwen's B. R. pen was the highest for the week with 42.7 points (44 eggs). Mr. H. C. Muttart's B. R. were a close second with 42.6 points (40 eggs); Mrs. Alex. Hamilton's B. R. were third with 40.9 points (37 eggs); Mr. J. L. Clark's B. R. were fourth with 37.5 points (45 eggs); Experimental Station pen of W. L. No. 3 was fifth with 32.2 points (45 eggs); Mr. Everett Howatt's W. L. were sixth with 31.6 points (38 eggs); Mr. H. C. Muttart's B. R. hens number 70, 64, 69, and 68 were first, second, third and fourth to date with 50.9 points, 46, 46.7 and 46 points respectively. The standing of these birds from one pen has not been equalled in previous contests. Mr. Harold Laird's hen No. 196 was fifth with 42.1 points (46 eggs) and Mr. Everett Howatt's hen No. 111, which lead the contest for many weeks is now sixth with 40.7 (37 eggs).

Mr. H. C. Muttart's pen of B. R. leads the Contest to date with 32.1 points (362 eggs); Mr. Wm. Coughlan's B. R. are second with 24.3 points (209 eggs); Experimental Station pen of Leghorns No. 3 is third with 24.8 points (341 eggs); Mr. Clifford McEwen's B. R. are fourth with 22.5 points (262 eggs); Mrs. J. F. Easton's W. L. are fifth with 19.6 points (256 eggs); Mr. M. Cutcliffe's B. R. are sixth with 19.5 points (271 eggs); Mr. Harold Laird's B. R. are seventh with 19.5 points (192 eggs); Mr. Glen McLaren's B. R. are ninth with 17.3 points (193 eggs).

There are still 16 birds in the Contest that have not started to lay. There were 17 birds that laid 6 eggs, 47 that laid 5, and 31 that laid 4 eggs during the week.
