TURNIP SEED SUPPLY.—Prof. G. LeLachur, of the Department of Agriculture, returned yesterday from Truro, N. S., where he had been conferring with Mr. S. J. Moore, Maritime Seed Inspector, in regard to providing an adequate supply of Swede turnip seed for next year. A conference of Canadian seedsmen will be held in Toronto on June 19th to consider ways and means of providing first root and vegetable seeds.

CHURCH MEETING.—The fourth meeting of the Quarterly Official Board of the Cornwall Circuit was held in the church at Kingston on the evening of May 30th. Rev. J. Heaney, B. A., President. There was a good attendance of members from all the preaching appointments. The reports of the circuit stewards showed an increase in the amount contributed for ministerial support and the salary was increased by \$100. During the year the circuit contributed \$360 to the General Missionary Society, an increase over last year. The amount of \$312 was contributed to other connectional funds. The report of the Woman's Missionary Society was very gratifying. The report by auxiliaries was as follows: Cornwall \$196, North Wiltshire \$189, Kingston \$42, a total of \$427; an increase of \$52 over last year. Thus the total raised by the circuit for missions was \$775. Robert A. Boyle, one of the circuit stewards, who had held office for 25 years tendered his resignation which was regrettably accepted. A resolution expressing appreciation of his services was unanimously adopted. The following stewards were re-elected: Frank Howard, J. P. Crosby, Nicholas Cotwell, Golding Smith, Cecil Stewart, William Bowman, J. T. Godfrey and recording steward Geo. Cruwys. W. H. Mallett was elected steward to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Robert A. Boyle. All the members of the Board expressed a wish to have Mr. Heaney remain on the circuit another year.
