It is the first station building on the Island or Provinces to be built of this material. 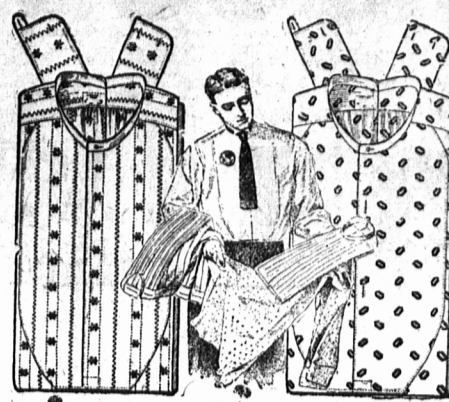
THE Trainor team are desirous of playing a return match and in view of the closeness of last night's game it should draw a crowded house.
