OTTAWA, Aug. 25—(CP)—Government announcements of nationwide and, in some cases, worldwide importance followed one another in rapid succession during the week just closed and there is every indication developments this week will keep up the same relentless pace.

The visit of Mayor LaGuardia of New York and American associates on the board is awaited with keen interest here. They likely will be met at the station by Col. O. M. Biggar, who tops the list of Canadian members.
