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SUPREME COURT - The Michaelmas term of the Supreme Court opened in this city yesterday, with the three judges on the bench. Judgments were rendered in the case of Montgomery v. Diamond, and the case of the Bank of Montreal vs. Angus McLean and others. The first judgment which will be found in full in another column, was in favor of the appellant, J. A. Bentley, K. C. for the respondent and K. J. Martin, K. C. for the respondent. In the second case, an action arising out of collateral notes of the Canadian Farm Products Company, judgment was rendered for the defendant. Mr. Justice Arsenault granting a non-suit. Messrs. Dana and Duffy for appellant, and Messrs. Martin and McKinnon for respondent. On motion of Mr. Martin, K. C., an order was granted admitting Michael Alvin Farmer, B. POTATO VESSEL HERE - The S. S. Bessegen, of Denmark, arriving in this port on Sunday morning, after a stormy passage from Cornerbrook, Nfld., which port she left on Thursday morning. The Bessegen is now loading seed potatoes at the Railway wharf for the Southgate Import and Export Company, Norfolk, Virginia. This is the second vessel to be loaded here this fall for the Southgate Company by the Potato Growers Association of P. E. I. Buntain, Bell and Co. are the local agents.

MONUMENT LIGHTS FINISHED - Yesterday the Maritime Light and Power Co., completed the erection of the two standards in front of the Soldiers Memorial and they were turned on for the first time last night. Each of the standards, which are of handsome design standing on a two foot concrete base and fifteen feet in height contains three lights one 150 candle power and two 100 candle power. The six provide a brilliant illumination that shows up the monument with fine effect at night.

Arrangements were made for the Armistice Memorial service and parade to be held at the soldiers monument on Armistice Day. It was unanimously agreed by all present that this parade must be held on the real Armistice Day, Nov. 11th at 11 a.m., with each in full of the medals, to fall in memory of the G. W. V. A. home at 10.15.

The parade will be headed by the band and marshalled by Major H. L. Bethune. The executive were empowered to arrange the program and instructed to request the two overseas Padres on the island, Capt. Rev. G. C. Taylor and Capt. Rev. J. Rooney, to take part in the service.

The spirit of unity which exists among the returned men was further shown when the meeting requested that an invitation be extended to all South African Veterans to join on parade with the Great War Veterans in commemorating the signing of the Armistice.

SERVICES AT ST. DUNSTON'S - At St. Dunstan's Cathedral yesterday All Saints Day High Mass was celebrated by Rev. Father McCall. Rev. Father McMahon was Deacon, and Rev. Father Smith, Sub-Deacon. An able and inspiring sermon was preached by Rev. Maurice McDonald. At the evening service at 7 o'clock offered for the dead of the congregation took the place of the Annual Sunday service at the cemetery. The full mass choir, under the direction of Mr. W. J. Brown, rendered, "Miserere mei," "De Profundis," "Libera," harmonized for the occasion, "Miserere mei Deus," and "Lift up thy Prayer." The sermon for the occasion was preached by Rev. Father McMahon. His Lordship Bishop O'Leary officiated.

The death occurred suddenly at Mayfield of Mrs. James Snowie at the age of 78 years. The late Mrs. Snowie was a woman who possessed many good qualities, was always ready to help in sickness and the needy often felt the hand that now is quiet and still. She leaves to mourn the loss of a loving and kind mother, five children, namely: Christie, Mrs. John Matheson, Maggie, Mrs. Alfred Munroe; Ethel, Mrs. Wallace Sillick of Portland, Maine; Mabel, Mrs. Herman Hill; and Gordon David at home.

The funeral service was conducted by Rev. M. E. Aitken, who spoke in a very eloquent manner. Interment was made in New Glasgow Cemetery. The pall bearers were: Messrs. Daniel Bullman, John Beaton, Howard Carr, Gordon Carr, Allan Moffat, Herman Hill. The many friends of the grief-stricken family extend to them their heartfelt sympathy.

The citizens of Charlottetown were very much shocked on Saturday afternoon last to learn of the sudden death of Dr. Gordon T. Alley. Dr. Alley had just gone down to the Charlottetown Hospital to attend his patients there when he was taken suddenly ill, and although skilled medical practitioners were with him he passed away in a very short time.

Dr. Alley was born in Charlottetown on the 22nd of October, 1874. He was the son of the late George Alley, Judge of the County Court of Queens County. He received his elementary education in West Kent School, Charlottetown, and later he went to Bishop's College School at Lennoxville, Quebec, where he spent four years. He then entered McGill University where he graduated in June, 1899, with the degree of M. D. C. M. He then returned to Charlottetown and entered upon the practice of his profession.

In 1902 Dr. Alley went abroad for a year spending his time in the hospitals of Edinburgh, Glasgow, and London and there received the degrees of L. R. C. P., L. R. C. S. and L. F. G. Then after some years residence in Charlottetown in active practice he spent three years in London, took a diploma in professional law, and was a member of the G. W. V. A.

Dr. Alley has always taken an interest in public affairs. He was twice elected to the City Council of the City of Charlottetown. He was also a Commissioned Officer in the Prince Edward Island Light Horse. He also took an active interest in athletics. He was a member of Victoria A. F. & A. M., and the G. W. V. A.

In 1913 after the close of the Great War, where he had served for several years, Dr. Alley married Miss Dora Jenkins of South Wales, who, with one little daughter survives him.

The funeral takes place this afternoon from his late residence, Prince Street, service starting at 2 p.m., funeral leaving at 2.30 p.m. by road for Sherwood Cemetery. Rev. E. M. Malone will be the officiating clergyman.

(PRINCE EDWARD ISLANDER HONORED) - Rev. J. Alexander Ford, B.A., M.A., for 40 years an ordained minister, and for ten years a Licentiate of the old East Point, P. E. Island Baptist Church, was given an ovation by his church at Cashmere, Wash., U. S. A., Oct. 18th. The church was beautifully decorated with autumn leaves, cut flowers and ferns. The music was exceptionally fine. It consisted of anthems,

quartettes, solos. Dr. H. Bailey, the Supt. of the State Convention, was present with his bride and gave the proceedings a pleasing official sanction. Greetings were read from the East Point Baptist Church, P. E. I., the church with which Mr. Ford and Mrs. Ford united in their early youth; also from Dr. D. G. McDonald, who baptized them. Words of hearty congratulations were also read from old classmates of Acadia University, H. T. Ross, D. C. L. Secretary of the Bankers Association, Toronto, and Rev. S. W. Cummings, D. D. Redlands University, California; also from the Baptist Church, Houlton, Maine, where Mr. and Mrs. Ford spent eight of the busiest years of their lives; and from the "Ford Bible Class" connected with the Houlton Church, and organized by Rev. Ford in 1908. The sermon by Dr. Bailey was drawn from the text, "There was a man sent from God whose name was John." He emphasized the idea of a God-sent man as being the basic qualification of a true minister. At the close of the address Rev. and Mrs. Ford stood in front of the platform supported by Dr. and Mrs. Bailey while Mrs. Allison City Librarian, presented each of the ladies with a beautiful bouquet of Ophelia roses with an appropriate address of affectionate appreciation while the congregation rose and sang a suitable melody.

The banquet at 6.30 p.m. in the church dining-room was largely attended, and good fellowship and unity prevailed. At the close of the banquet a young lady appeared carrying an immense cake, especially prepared for the occasion, on which were placed 50 lighted candles emblematic of Mr. Ford's 50 years of public service. This was placed before the pastor and his wife. As all the electric lights were turned off, and the faces of the people were turned toward the lighted candles, the scene was beautiful and memorable. At that moment one of the church officers presented Rev. Ford with a gold "Konkln" pencil case, as a memento of the occasion.
