## Horse Racing Service To Discontinue

CHICAGO, Nov. 14—(AP)—M. L. Annenberg's national racing news service, a continent-spanning wire network linking race tracks to thousands of betting rooms, was doomed to dissolution today.

United States District Attorney William J. Campbell announced that Weymouth Kirkland, counsel for Annenberg and the system, had informed him his clients had decided "immediately to dissolve Nationwide News Service, Inc., and definitely and forever quit the business of providing race information over wire to gamblers and bookies," the prosecutor added.

"Dissolution of Nationwide News Service, Inc., will affect not only every state in the union but the Dominion of Canada and Cuba."

Annenberg's attorney reported that the facilities used for transmitting race entries, odds, results and payoff prices from the tracks to horse playing parlors may be cut off tomorrow or at a later date Thursday noon.

"Council has stated that his clients voluntarily entered contracts with the A. T. and T. Company and the Western Union Telegraph Company," Campbell said.

"In addition, he declared his clients have expressed a wish to assist the government in preventing the dissemination by anyone of race information for illegal purposes."

Campbell termed the development a clear-cut victory for the Department of Justice in its effort to rid the nation of a vast illegal combine to violate Federal and state laws.

State's Attorney Thomas J. Courtney commented:—

"This marks the end of the biggest racket in the country."

The voluntary decision to shut down Nationwide News Service came in the midst of a joint move by Campbell and Courtney to deprive the network of wires.

## Red Wings Hand Out Third Straight Defeat Of Season To Americans

MADISON SQUARE GARDENS, NEW YORK, Nov. 14—(CP)—Detroit Red Wings tonight cut short a third period New York rally and handed the Americans a 4-2 licking, their third straight National Hockey League defeat of the season.

The defeat left the Amerks still without a victory in their three starts of the new season.

Outplayed for two seasons, the revamped Americans staged a two-goal rally in the third period but Sid Howe's breakaway goal in the final minutes of play spoiled the New Yorker's challenge.

Detroit went into the lead late in the first period when rookie Ken Kilrea skated in to rap home Cecil Dillon's passout from the corner. This combination clicked again early in the second period after a fast passing play almost the length of the ice. Keating made it 3-0 for the Red Wings on Howe's pass five minutes later.

In the third period Manager Red Dutton sent a five-man American attack up the ice and Johnny Sorrell scored their first tally after five minutes. In the next power play rookie Murray Armstrong counted again but a penalty to

Hooley Smith for interference broke down the attack. Howe's clinching goal came on a passout from Scotty Bowman while all the Americans were up the ice.

"We're going to have the finest lighting plant in the game for 1940," President Horace Stoneham said.

"We'll have seven games under the lights during the 1940 season."

## Boston Bruins Defeat Black Hawks 3-1 In Overtime Period

BOSTON, Nov. 14—(CP)—Boston Bruins, with Eddie Shore back in the lineup, scored two goals in overtime tonight to defeat Chicago Black Hawks 3-1 in a National Hockey League game. It was Boston's first victory in three games and their first home game this season.

The Stanley Cup defenders, opening their 16th home season, trailed until the 53rd minute, when Bill Hollett put them on even terms by combining with Shore.

That tally nullified the Chicago counter, made during the third minute of play by rookie Doug Bentley, who had a trial in the Bruins' training camp last season.

In the overtime period, the Bruins redoubled their efforts, but their fight appeared doomed when Captain Dit Clapper drew a penalty.

But when the Black Hawks attempted a five-man rush, Milt Schmidt broke away and managed to bang home the clincher as Art Wiebe checked fiercely and big Earl Selbert attempted to nail him from behind. Hollett registered the third Boston goal while polishing off another breakaway play.

Before the game, league president Frank Calder presented the Bruins with their Stanley Cup Medals and the National Hockey League's pennant was raised.
