The "solid block" in Nova Scotia is broken. The Island-Block of four is about as solid and durable now as a snowball would be under a midsummer sun at noon. Within a few months Ontario and Prince Edward Island have passed into the Conservative column. Liberalism has been tried and found wanting in the two years past. It has neither the leaders nor the measures to command respect or support in Canada. The Progressive party has been only a disturbing element in politics without benefit to the farmers and has lost its strength in Ontario. The people of Canada do not want class rule, or occupational control.

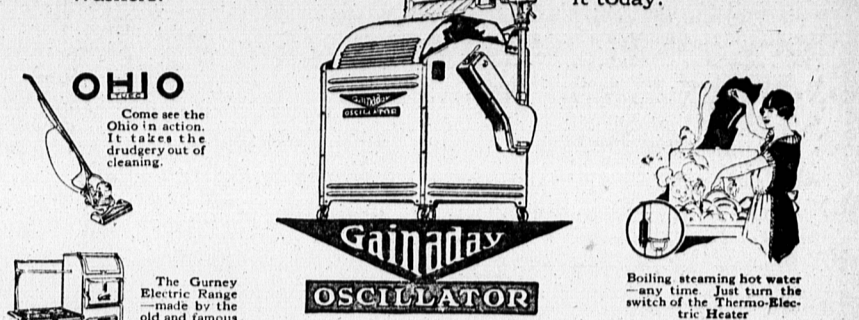
Premier King's negligible majority in Parliament is reduced to nothing by the result in Halifax. He can only carry on through another session by the aid of Progressive support, which he may purchase by further bribes, add to those already paid. A redistribution bill must be passed before a general election can be held. Meanwhile the exodus from the Liberal to the Conservative ranks goes on and increases from day to day. The discredited Premier might choose to appeal to the country soon, if only to escape the more crushing defeat that must come from delay. His hesitant vacillating mind tells that he will cling to power as long as he can, while the people are daily turning more and more to the Grand Old Conservative Party which has made Canada.
