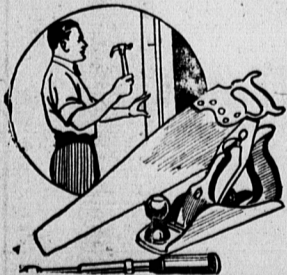

WILL CITES GIRLS' BRAVERY

LONDON, Sept. 5.—The bravery of a girl ambulance worker during war-time air raids on London was brought to light for the first time by the publication of the will of Lieut. Commander Thomas Crichton Mugliston, M. R. C. S.
Commander Mugliston in his will, which included a bequest to Alice Bryen, expressed his admiration and appreciation of the young woman's courage and devotion to duty during air raids. Although her splendid service never had been recognized by the Government, the will stated, she was one of the heroines of the War. Many times, Commander Mugliston declared, she drove through falling bombs and shrapnel to rescue the injured and dying.
Miss Bryen, when interviewed, made light of her remarkable work. "I was young and head-strong in those days," she declared, "and I thoroughly enjoyed the thrill of rushing around when everybody else was taking shelter."
"I arrest you. I am a gangster in the service of the police."
