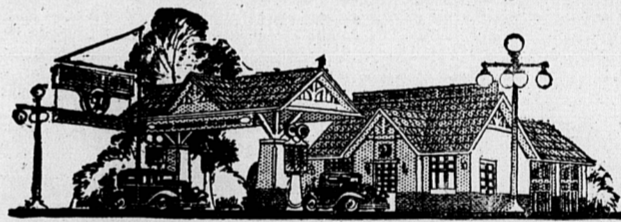

TUPLIN PEN WINS OUT

Notes for the Final Week of the P.E.I. Egg Laying Contest, Oct. 23, 1929

The contest was won by James Tuplin's pen of Barred Plymouth Rocks with 2164.2 points, 1959 eggs; Mr. William Sansom's Barred Rocks were second 2148.3 points, 2051 eggs; The Kensington Baby Chick Hatchery were third with 2119.9 points, 1906 eggs; Mr. H. C. Muttart's were fourth with 2091.3 points; 1899 eggs; Mr. A. L. Roger's were fifth with 2058.8 points, 1944 eggs; Mrs. Alfred Eyle's were sixth with 2028.9 points, 1935 eggs and Mrs. J. F. Easton's White Leghorns were seventh with 1971.2 points, 1855 eggs.

Mr. J. W. Bell's hen No. 137 led the contest with 279.9 points, 244 eggs. His hen No. 135 was third with 276.1 points, 234 eggs; The Charlottetown Experimental Station hen No. 57 was second with 279.1 points, 243 eggs; Mr. James Tuplin's hens 126 and 130 were fourth and ninth with 273.3 and 257.7 points and 232 and 225 eggs respectively. The Kensington Baby Chick Hatchery was fifth with hen 29 with 272.7 points, 247 eggs; Mrs. Alfred Eyle's hens No. 78 and 80 were sixth and tenth with 269.7 and 254.1 points, 257 and 219 eggs respectively; Mrs. J. F. Easton's hen No. 168 was seventh with 264.5 points, 230 eggs; Mr. A. L. Roger's hens No. 39 and 35 were eighth and eleventh with 263.2 and 254.1 points and 235 and 220 eggs respectively.

Fifty-eight hens laid over 200 eggs during the contest year. Three of these were disqualified, two on account of small eggs and one because of standard disqualifications. Fifty-five birds were registered, as compared with 89 in the 1929 contest.
