A DISREPUTABLE KING.

Leopold II, King of the Belgians, was born in 1835 and succeeded to the throne in 1835. He has long been notorious for his conduct toward the late Queen before and during her fatal illness, and towards his daughter on the occasion of the funeral. It is said of him that he made no effort to conceal his profligacy from his family or the public. His name was a by-word throughout Europe; there was no great gambling house where he was not seen; no place where pleasure meant license to which he had not been. Age brought no change. He made one perfunctory visit to his wife's house some months before she died, and returned to the scene of his pleasure, where the news of her end found him.

When he returned to Belgium he drove his daughter from her mother's house and then, with all his crimes upon him, knelt by the coffin of the dead Queen "to pray for thirty minutes." Fancy the hoary profligate praying for the soul of the virtuous Queen under such conditions. We read of the crowds that cheered the departing Princess, and can imagine what are their feelings toward Leopold. Thrones have been sometimes lost for less than his rank offences. We of the British Empire have reason to be thankful that the throne has been so greatly strengthened by the character of the late good Queen and our present noble King.

The States of the Australian Commonwealth have had a number of pretty big deficits this year. The Victorian deficit is \$2,188,000; New South Wales, about \$1,750,000; Queensland, \$2,169,000; South Australia, \$1,111,000, and Tasmania, \$221,000. Westralia has a solitary surplus of nearly a million dollars, but this is solely due to the fact that Westralia still retains its border customs revenue, which is a diminishing quantity, and will disappear in about four years.

Attention is directed to the announcement in our local columns of a meeting of the Temperance Alliance to be held this evening in the Y. M. C. A. Building at 7.30 o'clock. The object is to consider the present conditions with regard to the recent notorious violation of the Prohibitory Law by well-known dealers and the entire inaction of the Government Prosecutor for weeks past. It is expected that there will be some plain speaking at the meeting, and all friends of law and order are desired to be present. The Guardian will also have something further to say on the subject to-morrow.

The death of Mr. James Reddin, briefly mentioned in our issue of yesterday, removed one of Charlottetown's oldest and best known citizens. He was born in this city in 1822. In early life he was in partnership with his father in a general mercantile business and also engaged in ship-building quite extensively. Later he engaged in business for himself on Queen Street. He served for several terms as representative of Ward Two in the City Council and was for several years in succession President and then Patron of the Irish Benevolent Society. In 1878 he was appointed Inspector of Weights and Measures by the Mackenzie Government, which office he held for twenty years and was then superannuated. In 1850 he married Louisa Anna, youngest daughter of Mr. John Mathews, of Kew, Surrey, England, who died in 1867. There are eight surviving children viz: James H., Barrister of this city; Florence, widow of the late D. H. Pitts, of Halifax N. S.; Edith, widow of the late W. H. Kiaz, of Spring Green, Wisconsin; Louis J. representing Archibald & Co., Truro N. S.; Arthur W. druggist of this City and Agnes, Gertrude and Ellie at home. The deceased gentleman was much respected in all the relations of life. His funeral takes place this morning to St. Dunstan's Cathedral at 9 o'clock.

OF INTEREST TO TEACHERS.

The Educational Department of Ontario has issued an official statement signed by Mr. John Miller, Deputy Minister of Education which will be eagerly studied by all school teachers throughout Ontario as it modifies the regulations which govern the examinations for school teachers' certificates, and will affect to some extent. Latin is to be relegated to the shelf along with other dusty subjects which school teachers are not supposed to dilly into, and in accordance with the spirit of this age the study of chemistry is to be a sine qua non with the thousands of pupils who go up to the annual junior leaving examinations. In a few years the course for public school teachers certificates will consist mainly of English, mathematics and science. In the future days, to the great joy of many pupils no language will be either prescribed or optional. Sir,—The above abstract has been clipped from an Ontario journal. Would it not be in accordance with the spirit of the age for our educational institutions to lay aside the dead languages, until at least students knew English? As Ontario is often referred to as a model, to be followed in educational matters, and as many of our progressive educationists in this Province have been agitating for the same thing, there should not be any hesitation on the part of the powers that be, to take action without delay.

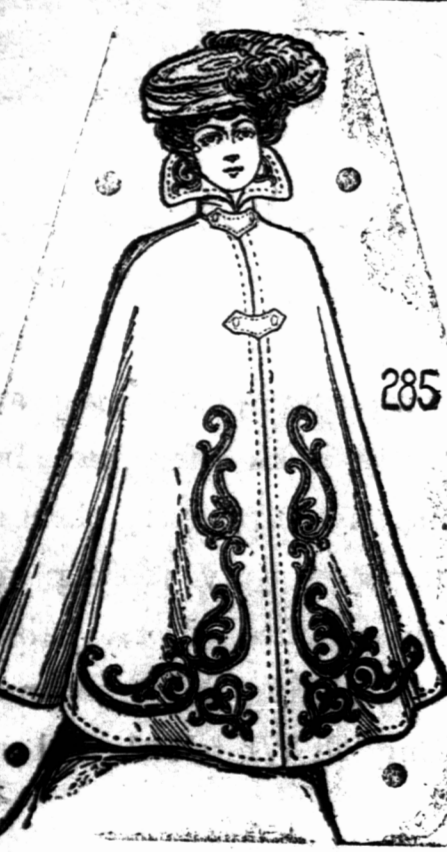
BY ELECTIONS IN QUEBEC.
