The first number on the program was an instrumental selection by Prof. Watta and orchestra. Mr. Miller then spoke as follows:

Ladies and Gentlemen: The students have called us together tonight, previous to their departure to enjoy their Christmas holidays, and I find that they have placed in my hands a somewhat lengthy program. Therefore, I will not take up any more of the time just now but will proceed with the program. We will now have a solo from Mr. Holroyd.

Mr. Miller: Next devolves upon me the pleasure of presenting diplomas to those who are fortunate to graduate at this season of the year. We have not a great many. I will now call upon Mr. Nash, Editor of the Patriot to address the students. I call upon him for the simple reason that he knows a great deal about our work; he has a right to know, because his sister was with us last year and his daughter is at present under our tuition. I know he is honest enough to tell you just what he thinks of us. I have much pleasure in introducing Mr. Nash.

Mr. Nash: Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen: You behold me in such a position tonight that I am almost frightened out of my senses. I never knew I assure you that I was expected to make an address. I will just whisper this to you so that Mr. Miller will not hear me—I had not the slightest idea that I was going to speak to you until he asked me five minutes ago.

Now, Ladies and Gentlemen, you are well aware that it is a good man who can think at all; and it is a far better man who can think on his feet—he is a phenomenon. However I do not claim to be this. But as the principal has asked me to say a few words regarding the College I will try to do so.

I believe myself from men who have studied educational matters that a classical education is a magnificent thing to possess. I am not quite satisfied, however, that a classical education is all that one

should possess. This is the age of the practical man. Some would call it the materialistic age. Others might say not a materialistic age compared with the ages of the past or the ages which are to come; but it is classical and practical too. I can assure you, the pupil who enters life, and learns the practical things of life, and all so studies the practical things of life will, beyond the shadow of a doubt, not only be able to gain a livelihood in this world by hard and strenuous competition but at the same time be able to educate the soul as well as the intellect.

I want the pupils to listen to me for a moment. I am at a great loss as to what I will say to you. I am not qualified to give you any advice, but I want you to remember this: there are three ways to get through the world—you can loaf through the world, you can shirk through the world, and you can work through the world. Sometimes I feel tired or I imagine I am tired and take a day off. Unless I am really ill at the end of the day I am far more fatigued than I was at the beginning. Your part in life is this: Success spells work; and work spells success. Your duty is not to idle through life but to do your part.

My experience with this College of which my worthy friend, Mr. Miller is the head, has been sufficient to show me that the work that is done in that institution is of a thorough character. It is tested not only by the students who have obtained positions in Charlottetown, and throughout this province, but also owing to the students whom I have heard speak of this evening. Men in the United States, women in Western Canada, women in Ontario and in the larger provinces— young ladies, if you like, and young gentlemen—who are to say, not only filling responsible positions as bookkeepers, and heads and managers of large concerns, but also as stenographers and typewriters. There are none to excel them in any part of this broad Dominion. That speaks well for the work done in the C. B. C.

I see before me students who have attended the school of this country. They came to the conclusion that they do not want to teach; they do not want to enter a professional life; but they want to take their part in the great mercantile world, to which this country owes so much.

I want you to understand, Ladies and Gentlemen and pupils, that we all have our part in life; we must understand the nobility of labor. The husbandman, the artisan and the professional man are all in the eyes of One; and they should be equal in the eyes of each other. Where would England be today if it were not for her commercial supremacy of the sea? It is said that the "Trade follows the flag" just as sure as we are standing here tonight those pupils who have entered into the practical life have just the same value in the eyes of the statesman, as those who are in the professional state engaged in what they call higher spheres.

I hardly know what to say to you pupils but I will draw a little illustration. I will do it in this character. If I were at college again, I will tell you the course I think I would pursue. First I would endeavour to train my mind up to habits of work; I would never idle a moment of my time. Pluck, Push and Perseverance would be my motto; and I would endeavor at the same time, to instill into myself kindness to all, charity, and love for my fellow men and women. At the same time believing that if a brother were sick to visit him, and if I were endowed with greater talents, it would be my place not to use these talents to hold him down but to lift him up and make him strong in the community.

At college you have an opportunity that you will never have again in life. The habits that you form early in life will live through life with you, and will not be shaken. The foundation you build in college will stay with you. Cultivate with that work, cultivate honesty, sincerity, perseverance, and Christianity, believing always that it is not your duty to accumulate wealth, but it is your duty, to do your part in life so that when life is finished anyone can say of you "He set well his part and after him his works will live!"

I have made these rambling remarks, and I hope I have struck a chord here and there. I have been thinking on my feet, as I stated at the beginning, and have proven myself if not a phenomenon at least somewhat of an advisor.

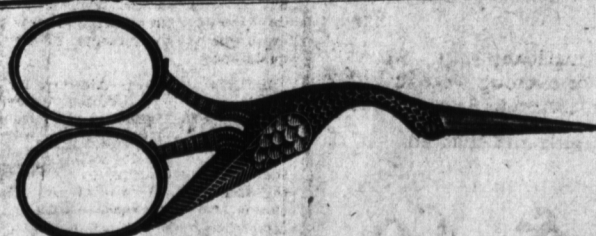
