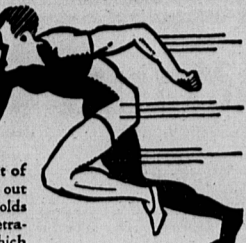

The League of Nations

The series of articles recently appearing in the Saturday issues of this paper, has been discontinued. Readers interested in the subject are referred to the letter of Mrs. Wilkins below: Editor Guardian.

Sir, - For several weeks items of interest regarding the work of the League of Nations have been published in the local press. This information is intended to aid teachers and pupils in the annual examination on that subject, which takes place in the city schools about the end of November.

The examination is sponsored by the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire with the following end in view to present to the pupils in the simplest language why and how the League came into existence and what it is doing not only to maintain world peace, but to enable all nations to work together for the common good. It is not our purpose to overburden the teachers, although this subject bulks largely in current history which is already included in the curriculum of the Prince Edward Island schools, but we feel that even a limited amount of instruction in world problems must inevitably make our children more intelligent citizens.

While we may admit that the League has not fulfilled our highest expectations in maintaining world peace, we cannot overlook the fact that it is the only great world organization today that is working to avert war. Unfortunately those who desire war for their own selfish ends are even more active today than they were at the time of the great war, and it is this important point on which we hope the teachers will place particular stress.

It has been proved beyond reasonable doubt that the armament firms of the world have done all in their power to prevent the establishment of lasting peace. With vast wealth at their disposal they not only influence governments but they control prominent newspapers all over the world. Thus they fan the flame of narrow national prejudice and arouse fear by false but skillful propaganda. It is hard to realize that men are willing to build their fortunes on the blood and suffering of the nations, but the facts remain.

We have not forgotten the world war with its ten million dead, its many millions crippled, and its expenditure of thousands of millions. Therefore we feel justified in urging that our children be taught the underlying causes that may lead to an even more colossal struggle, and to realize that war as it is waged today is the ultimate futility. Rules of Scoring

Substitution - While thirteen birds constitute the entry, the records of the ten highest birds will constitute the pen score. The production of the ten highest birds each week will be added to the previous total for the pen, this to constitute the total to date. Should

a bird die her record to date will be struck out. No further substitution will be allowed except in the case of an acute epidemic from which deaths occur before the end of the sixteenth week in which case the pen may be brought back to full strength.
