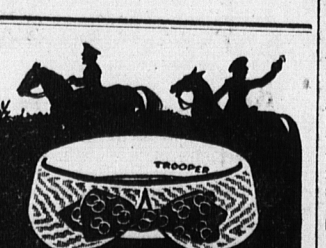

FIGHTING ON THE WESTERN FRONT

(Special to The Guardian.) PARIS, Aug. 24.—Official—Artillery again to-day on both sides showed marked activity in Belgium, in the region of Boesinghe, France, in Artois, in the sector north-east of Arras, and between the Somme and the Oise.

A squadron of seven aeroplanes, on the night of August 24, shelled the stations at Terniger and Noyon, and dropped more than eighty bombs.

GERMANS MURDER AND NOT FIGHT.

LONDON, Aug. 24.—The Copenhagen correspondent of Reuter's Telegram Co., sends the following regarding the sinking of the British submarine:—The destruction of the British submarine E-13 in Danish territory by German destroyers under circumstances which placed the shipwrecked crew under Danish protection, has aroused widespread indignation which finds expression in the Danish newspapers.

The Koebenhaven writes: "We read the news with deep pain that four hundred sailors of a friendly nation lost their lives, not in unequal combat, but without the faintest chance of defending themselves."

POTATO FIELDS IN N.B. STRUCK HARD BY RUST. FREDERICTON, N. B., Aug. 24.—The potato fields in Victoria, Charlottetown and York Counties which comprise the large potato area of New Brunswick are seriously affected by rust, according to reports received from the Provincial Agricultural Department and from other sources.
