### Players Will Not Leave Moncton Team

Montreal Fails To Obtain Gould And Kervin, Star Hockey Players

ST. JOHN, Jan. 13.—Quite a stir was caused in Moncton hockey circles by the rumor that the Canadian National Railways at Montreal were seeking to obtain the transfer of Gould and Eddie Kervin, stars of the Atlantic hockey team. Both men are rated highly in Maritime hockey circles and would be a strong addition to any of the Upper Canadian teams.

Moncton has a real fast team this season, the best in years, and have apparently no intention of allowing any of the Upper Canadian cities to wreck their pennant chances.

### Picking Derby Winner Has The Experts Going

Among the Popular Early Choices of Turfmen are Call Boy, Sickle Birthright and Applecross.

LONDON, Jan. 13.—Now that flat racing has closed till next March, the big topic among the followers of the sport is possible favorites for next year's Derby. There was a time when the winter favorite had been heavily backed before Christmas, and more often than not this horse won the race. In recent years there has been no substantial betting until after the race for the Two Thousand Guineas has been run.

The most popular early fancies for the great Epsom race are Call Boy, Sickle, Birthright and Applecross. These were the first four in the Middle Park Stakes, and are so close together that it would only be necessary for any one to make a little greater relative improvement during the winter months to become the real live public fancy as a possible Derby winner.

Call Boy is by Hurry On—Comedienne, and is a half-brother to Jockey Kind. The latter has won twice over twelve furlongs. Call Boy won the Middle Park Stakes, known as the two-year-old "classics" and this race, for some remarkable reason, in recent years has been one of the worst guides to the Derby.

Sickle is bred to stay and showed good stamina. His dam, Selene, is reckoned to be one of the gamiest mares that ever saw a race track. She won the Liverpool Autumn Cup, Limekiln Stakes, Park Hill Stakes, was third in the Derby, second in the Ascot Gold Vase and the Coronation Cup.

Birthright was the first good colt of the season. He is by Synchron by John O'Gaunt, by Isinglass-La Fleche out of Linage by Tracery—Batonin by Isinglass—Baroness La Fleche by Lad—La Fleche.

Applecross by Hurry On—Edna is a colt of the gross type who has taken a lot of fling down. He won the last big two-year-old race, the Hurst Park great two-year-old stakes.

Many assert the season has not produced a really good two-year-old, and that the likely winner of the Derby may be something which has not run so far. Lord Woolavington's Caledon, by Hurry On—Wet Kiss, has yet to make her debut, but he has gained the reputation of being thought a better horse than his stable companion, Applecross.

French breeders are much interested in the King's entry, Saint Sylvester, reported to be more than useful, though he has still to see a race track. He is a half-brother (by Nouvel An) to that great horse, Filbert de Savoie.

### English Invasion Is Now Expected

United States Golf President Says Yanks And Britons Will Clash For Ryder Cup

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—An invasion of British golf professionals may be expected in this country early in the spring, so that the American open tournament to be held at the oakmont Country Club outside of Pittsburgh early in June will have the finest field in its history.

According to an announcement made public in Pittsburgh yesterday by William C. Fownes, Jr., President of the United States Golf Association, a series of competitions between British and American professionals for the Ryder Cup will be held near Pittsburgh preliminary to the American open championship event.

As predicted in The World some days ago, the agreement reached by American and British golf powers in regard to the dates of their open championship tournaments had its highly gratifying effect. Possibly it may also bring about an invasion of Great Britain by American professionals soon after the Fourth of July.

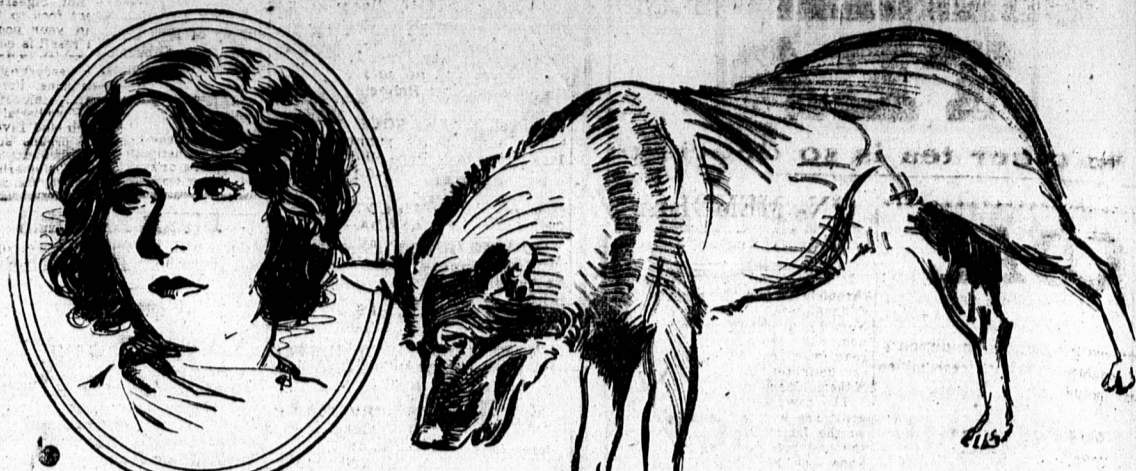
