DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY MEETINGS

At the executive meeting of the D. C. S. held in St. Paul's Church Parish Hall Tuesday afternoon, the usual routine business was transacted. The following resolutions among others were passed:

The Diocesan Church Society of Prince Edward Island, in General Meeting assembled, desires to congratulate Your Grace on your appointment to the Archbishopric of the Province of Canada.

Resolved, That this Society desires to express its sense of the loss the Church in this Province has sustained in the death of the late Archdeacon Rough and to tender its sincerest sympathy to his widow and the members of his family.

At the annual general meeting held in St. Paul's Parish Hall last night, with the Rev. Canon Simpson, D. C. L. in the Chair, the above resolutions were endorsed.

The following were elected representatives to the Domestic Mission Board which meets in Halifax, Rev. Rural Dean Watson, Rev. T. W. Murphy, Mr. Armand Thompson and Mr. T. E. MacNutt.

This meeting was to be addressed by Rev. W. P. Robertson, B. A., B. D., Rector of Truro, N. S., but he was unable to attend owing to ice conditions in the Straits.

Mrs. Murphy, wife of the Rector of St. Paul's Church, then gave an address on the missionary work being carried on at Kangra, India, where the Rev. R. H. A. Haslam and wife of this province are labouring, and with whom Mrs. Murphy had spent some eighteen months at Kangra. The address was illustrated with lantern slides. Both the address and slides were much appreciated.

The Rev. J. J. Bamford, Rector of Port Hill, then delivered an address on the subject "Is the Bible the Word of God?"

The Rev. Rural Dean Watson followed with an address on the subject of "Supply of Candidates for the Ministry."

At the close of the meeting a vote of thanks was tendered the speakers by Mr. Justice Haszard and seconded by Mr. Armand Thompson. A vote of thanks was also tendered to Mr. Walter Burke for having operated the lantern so satisfactorily.

The meeting was then dismissed with the singing of the National Anthem and the Benediction. A celebration of the Holy Communion took place at St. Paul's Church yesterday morning at 7.45, and during the morning a meeting of the Rural Deanery took place. There was also a meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in St. Peter's Hall at 3 o'clock.

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE A SERVICE OF SONG IN ZION CHURCH HALL

(Continued from Page One)

and better organization now coming into operation. Some important legislation will be submitted for your consideration. The accounts of Revenue and Expenditure for the past year and the reports of the various departments of the Government, together with the estimates for the current year will be laid before you.

You will learn with pleasure that a further reduction in the debt of the Province was made during the past year.

To these and all other matters that may be submitted to you I invite your earnest attention.

I now invoke upon your labors the blessing of Divine Providence in the confident assurance that the result of your deliberations will greatly benefit our people.

The Premier, Hon. J. A. Matheson, then presented a Bill entitled "An Act to amend an Act respecting Justices of the Peace" and moved that it be received and read a first time. The motion was put to the House and carried.

The Premier moved, and Hon. Mr. McLean seconded, the appointment of a special committee to prepare a list of members to compose the select standing committees of the House. The motion was carried, the special committee consisting of the Premier and Messrs. Kennedy and Myers.

The Premier, as Chairman of that committee, submitted a report, which was received and read, detailing the Standing Committees as follows:

On the motion of the Premier the report was concurred in. On the motion of Mr. L. L. Jenkins, Parvin Cass was appointed a messenger of the House.

The Premier moved that the Speech of His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor be considered to-morrow, and for that purpose it be made the first order of the day. The motion was seconded by Hon. Mr. McLean and carried.

The Premier then moved that when the House adjourned it should adjourn until 3 o'clock to-morrow afternoon. The motion was carried. On the motion of the Premier the House then adjourned to 3 p. m. to-morrow. With the singing of the National Anthem the proceedings terminated.

CONFIDENT OF THE RESULT

LONDON, March 14.—News of an advance comes from every part of the allied lines. The combined Anglo-French-Belgian armies numbering altogether over 3,000,000 men, are equipped as never before. Even the Belgians, now numbering 100,000, have adequate artillery and transport. Arrivals of enormous stores of ammunition and large reinforcements are continued uninterruptedly despite the submarine campaign. Our troops are in the pink of condition. Everything is being done that thought can suggest to perfect preparations. The muddy countryside is still a problem, particularly in Northern Flanders and Upper Alsace. Each day now however, enables guns to be better moved forward.

The allied advance will have two important results—preventing the Germans from further weakening their western front in order to support Von Hindenburg in the east and making the German carefully prepared counter-stroke more difficult. Everyone recognizes that the next few weeks must be enormously costly in lives. Plans have been made to remove all the wounded, except very serious or trivial cases, to England at the earliest possible moment. London alone has made provision for tens of thousands of casualties. Our troops are absolutely confident of the result.

The Times says: "Our army was never in better fettle. It is in exceedingly good spirits despite the long dreary winter trenches. The Daily News says: The British blow at Neuve Chapelle is a warning to Germany that it is dangerous to transfer forces to the east. The Morning Post says: There is no chance of Germany starving. Moreover, Germany considers herself victorious until cleared out of Flanders, France and Poland.

The service in Zion Church Hall last night assumed the nature of a song service and, as in all the other meetings, the hall was filled. After the opening exercises, the pastor told the story of a man who had fallen into a pit and was in danger of perishing, and of his being visited first by Buddha, who assured him that his sorry plight was all a matter of his own creating and explained that if he were not for his tenacious belief in his own sensations, which were after all a delusion, he would find himself perfectly at ease and in comfort. He advised him to dispense with the notion that there existed such a thing as sensation, and so passed on. Then Mohamet passed by and hearing his cries advised him to submit to fate, for he was in the pit because Allah had so willed it and it was useless to complain. He also passed on. Then a Jewish Rabbi came and looking on him exclaimed that he must have committed some heinous sin to be so punished. He advised him, if ever he got out, to beware of ever falling into a pit again. But there came another, the Man of Nazareth, who, without waiting even to be called upon, stooped down and lifted the man to safety. Miss Katie Murchison then sang the well-known hymn, "He lifted me." It was beautifully sung and illustrated the speaker's thought splendidly.

Miss Dorothy Sutherland sang with fine effect, "Oh may my walk be close with God." After which Mr. Taylor told the story of "The Pair." It was a tale of a godly man who, having lost wife and children through death, had still a friend who could not be taken from him. At the table a place was always set for this friend and the food placed there was given to the poor. In his walk abroad he held steady conversation with his friend, and this and other peculiarities led the neighbours to speak of him as "the Pair." The good man fell ill and lay dying, with a chair beside the bed for his companion. For days he lay with his hand stretched out as though in touch with that of his friend; then he died. The day of his burial was inclement and it was evening as the little company stood in the cemetery. The storm had ceased, and as they lowered the remains into the grave a momentary flash of the setting sun as it broke through the clouds, threw a ray of light against a shaft of white marble, which, reflecting it, threw a beam of white light into the grave. It was a fitting symbol for the close of such a life. May our walk with God be so close that even the tomb shall be radiated by His presence. With many fitting illustrations the pastor sought to bear in upon all the great need of living a life under the guidance of Christ if ever the expected to reach the Father's House.

A mixed quartette by Mrs. S. C. Moore, Miss Louise Lawson and Messrs. Frederick and John Gillis, was then given in a manner appreciated and enjoyed by all.

The service to-night will be held in the main auditorium of the church, when the Rev. Geo. Taylor will tell the story of "The Other Wise Man," as given by Dr. Henry Van Dyke. There will be special music and beautiful slides. A silver collection will be taken to defray expenses. Meeting opens at 8 o'clock.

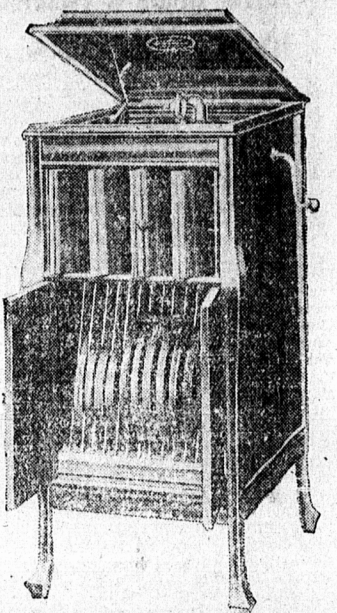
