**ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST**

**Reporters and Correspondents Everywhere.**

In Christ Church Cherry Valley tomorrow there will be (D. V.) Holy Communion at 9 a. m., afternoon service at 3 p. m. On Tuesday evening May 24th, at 7.30 p. m. there will be in the Church a lecture on "China—its country, people, customs, religions, and missionary work being done there," by Rev. W. O. White, for seven years missionary in Fuklier Province. A silver collection will be taken for missions.

Two following five schooners loaded by Wright Bros., sailed from Crapaud this week via: Eva May for Boston with 6000 bushels potatoes; Snow Queen for North Sydney with 3000 bushel oats, 900 bushel potatoes and 10 tons of hay; Elva M for Glace Bay with 2850 bushels potatoes, 3000 bushel oats, 20 tons of hay, straw and a quantity of turnips, carrots, etc.; Mayflower for Halifax with 1000 bushel potatoes, 600 bushel oats, 200 bushel turnips and 40 bushel carrots; North Star for St. Peter's with 1800 bushel oats, 150 bushel potatoes and 40 young pigs.

**ALBANY PLAINS:**—It is pleasing to learn that Mrs. Thomas Dunn, of Summerville, who was suffering from a severe illness is steadily improving.—J. L. Power of Summerville who has been on an extended trip to the United States recently returned home.—Miss Mary Acorn of Albany Plains was a passenger by the Northumberland this week on route to Boston.—A period of nearly two years having elapsed without school, the ratepayers of Elliotvale after many disputes, have finally built a large school which is a credit to the district. The new building is about two hundred yards south of the old site.

The Librarian whose loss near Codroy, Nfld., was reported in our despatches yesterday is a vessel of 5,000 tons gross, and was built in 1902. She was in Halifax for the first time on May 6, when she was on a voyage from Liverpool to Montreal, but could not proceed up the Gulf on account of ice. Leaving Halifax next day she was able to get to Montreal, and sailed from that Port on Saturday morning, with the following cargo, which was valued at \$250,000: 54,000 bushels of corn, 56 tons of cheese, 138 tons of hay, 602 cattle, 175 standard of deal, 1,500 sacks of flour, and 86 tons of general sundries. The vessel herself was valued at \$300,000.

There departed this life at Churchhill on Friday the 13th inst., of pneumonia, Catherine, beloved wife of Neil D. McFadyen in the 83rd year of her age. The deceased was in failing health during the past few years although being able nearly until to attend to her daily avocation until nine days previous to her death. She was then taken ill with pneumonia and on Friday morning passed peacefully away from this world of trials and sorrow to the rest that remains for God's people. The funeral service was conducted by her pastor Rev. Daniel McLean, who spoke in the highest terms of her as he had known her for the past twelve years. She leaves to mourn a husband five sons and two daughters, Donald A. of Lowell, Mass., Hugh and Nell of Rumford Falls, Maine, James C. now in Winnipeg, Mrs. Chas. Frizzle, New Haven and John G. and Catherine at home.

**OBITUARY.**—On Friday the 13th of May 1904, there passed from the scenes of earth to the joys of the better land, the soul of Mrs. Catherine Mutch of Mount Herbert, Lot 48, P. E. I., at the age of 75 years. Mrs. Mutch was an estimable neighbor, a kind and affectionate friend, a worthy and consistent member of the Methodist church from her early days. But it may well be said that her home was her palace where her presence and services were royal. She was an ideal wife and mother. "The heart of her husband safely trusted in her. She did him good and not evil all the days of his life. (Her husband predeceased her nearly three years). She opened her mouth with wisdom and in her tongue was the law of kindness. She looked well to the ways of her household. Her children arise up and call her blessed." Mrs. Mutch had the rare satisfaction of seeing her five sons all very comfortably settled in the neighborhood of her own residence. There is one married daughter, one a widow, and one single, whose devotion to her mother was sincere and affectionate to the end of her mother's life. In the death of Mrs. Mutch the home, the church and the community sustain an irreparable loss. On Monday the 15th of May the remains of Mrs. Mutch were laid to rest in the Mount Herbert cemetery. The services at the house and the grave were conducted by Rev. Richard Ople assisted by the Revs. D. McLean and W. W. Lodge. The funeral was very largely attended by relatives and friends of the deceased.

A MONTREAL correspondent has sent The Guardian the following item:—Dr. W. W. Wickham of Tignish died at St. Agathe on the 14th. His body accompanied by Mr. McFadyen father-in-law, arrived in Montreal at 8.30 a. m. on the 16th where it was met by Rev. Charles McDonald, Bishop of Charlottetown, who was in Montreal on his return trip home, by Rev. Father Gerald McShane, Justice Doherty, Justice Curran, Dr. E. J. Mullolly, J. Mercier and Martin Egan. The body was conveyed to the Club House of the Knights of Columbus on the corner of Sherbrooke and Park Ave awaiting the departure of the evening train for the Maritime Provinces. At 6 p. m. before a large number of the Knights of Columbus a funeral service was held by the Rev. Father Hefferman and McShane after which the body was escorted to the C. P. R. station. Prominent among the large funeral procession were Justice Curran, Justice Doherty, Justice Percell, F. Curran, F. Surveyor, J. Mercier, P. J. McCaffrey, Dr. J. A. McDonald, Martin Egan, Mr. Wickham, E. J. Mullolly, F. Green, W. Kearney, Dr. Harrison, J. Power, Mr. Ward, Dr. Prandergast, Bernard Sullivan, Louis Curran, Dr. Hockett and many others. It is understood that the body will be met by the Charlottetown Council Knights of Columbus at Moncton N. B. Universal sympathy is extended to the relatives and friends of the late Dr. Wickham. P. E. Island by his brother Knights in Montreal and by his large circle of friends in McGill University where he graduated with distinguished honors a few years ago.
