

Royals Win Maritime Juvenile Title

Jackson Fires Home Winning Counter With Less Than Two Minutes Of Play Left

TRURO, N.S., March 22—(CP)—Charlottetown Royals won the Maritime Juvenile Hockey Title Saturday night as they defeated Windsor, Nova Scotia champions, 5-5, in a sudden death final game.

Royals were New Brunswick Prince Edward Island champions. A goal by Jackson, Royals forward, gave the Islanders the tri-province title with only 1-2 minutes to go as the score was tied 5-5. Jackson picked up a loose puck inside the Windsor blue line and fired it through a maze of players.

Down two goals early in the third period, Windsor made a strong comeback, evening the count on A. Ettinger's two goals within a minute of each other. Ettinger produced three of his team's goals, with the others going to H. Ettinger and Burbridge.

Both teams played fast, clean hockey throughout, and referee Reg Beazley wasn't called on to hand out a single penalty.

Royals opened the scoring midway through the first period when Beck converted Judson's pass. Gregory, diminutive centre, put them two up a half minute later, ending the scoring for the period.

The Windsor players appeared tired from Friday night's Nova Scotia final game with Sydney and did not hit their stride in the opener. Faced with a two-goal deficit, they opened fast in the second and tied the game up with two goals before the halfway mark.

Laure Burbridge picked up a loose puck near his own net and skated through the entire Charlottetown team for the first, and H. Ettinger tallied five minutes later on a pretty passing play with Hughes.

The Royals roared ahead again when Beck scored on a pass from Beer. Beer put the Royals two up when he scored on a face-off from centre ice five seconds later. Windsor pressed hard for the remainder of the period and Oudmore turned in sensational net minding, allowing only one goal when A. Ettinger beat him on a pass from Hughes.

The Royals went two ahead for the third time when Beer scored his second goal of the game on a pass from Simmonds during a gang attack of the period and Oudmore again tied the score with A. Ettinger getting both goals on passes from H. Ettinger and Hughes.

With less than 2 minutes to go Jackson picked up a loose puck inside the Windsor blue line and fired what proved to be the winning counter.

Leafs Wallop Rangers Twice To Take Big Lead

MADISON SQUARE GARDENS, NEW YORK, March 22—(CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs tonight soundly outplayed the New York Rangers for a 4-2 victory at Madison Square Garden that gave the Leafs a lead of 2-0 in games in their four-of-seven Stanley Cup semi-final hockey series.

A near capacity crowd of 14,696 saw an exciting match which, coming on the heels of Toronto's 3-1 victory at home Saturday, left the Rangers, the league champions, in a desperate situation. To stay in the running they must take one game of the next two, either here on Tuesday or in Toronto on Saturday.

The Leafs, with rookie Johnny McCreey their scoring hero through two goals on plays set up for them by centre Pete Langelle, showed a power on attack and ruggedness on defence that had been lacking in most of their games on New York ice this season.

Toronto took a two-goal lead in the first period, on goals by McCreey and Gordon Drillon; lost it in the first three minutes of the second when Max Colville scored two quick goals while Nick Metz was serving a penalty for holding Bryan Hewitt, then went ahead once more on a pair by McCreey and Billy Drillon's goal, scored on a typical play with Apps who drew the defence, slipping a pass through to his right winger, was Gordie Drillon in Stanley Cup play—by far the most any player has attained in post-season competition.

Des Smith's Goal gives Boston win

CHICAGO, March 22—(CP)—A goal by Des Smith at 8:11 minutes of the overtime period tonight gave Boston Bruins a 2-1 decision over Chicago Black Hawks in the first game of their best-of-three Stanley Cup playoff series.

The crowd of 1,103 had been in an uproar since the Hawks knotted the count at one-all on a goal by Max Bentley with only a minute and 10 seconds remaining in the regular playing time. Boston had scored first at 11:08 of the first period, Roy Coacher getting the goal.

Both teams were playing offensive hockey in the overtime period and several times each goalie had been sent scrambling to make difficult saves. Almost all the members of both teams were grounded around the Chicago goal when Smith took a pass from Roy Coacher as he stood almost directly in front of the nets.

The puck went whistling past Sam Lo Presti as he fell in trying to make the save. Coacher and Bill Cowley were credited with assists.

Wings take Canadiens Into camp

DETROIT, March 22—(CP)—The Detroit Red Wings on two goals by centre Don Grosso, defeated the Montreal Canadiens, 2-1, here tonight before 12,371 in the opening game of their best-of-three quarter-final Stanley Cup Hockey play-off series.

Grosso, the Red Wings' leading shot-maker, beat goalie Paul Bibeault all alone midway in the opening period and then drilled the puck past him for what proved to be the game-winning margin soon after the second stanza started.

Second game of the series is scheduled for Montreal next Tuesday.

Fractures collar-Bone in practice

OTTAWA, March 22—(CP)—Tireless little Bobby Bauer went to hospital last night with a fractured collar-bone as the injury just struck hard at Royal Canadian Air Force Flyers on the eve of their first major test in the Allan Cup playdowns.

The 27-year-old right wing member of the celebrated Kraut Line from Boston Bruins of the National Hockey League fell heavily to the ice during a practice drill at Ottawa Auditorium. He will be out of the lineup for the rest of the season.

Coach Bill Touhey said Bauer "just seemed to lose his legs" as he coasted in on goal after splitting the defence.

The practice was Flyers' final workout in preparation for a best-of-five Eastern Canada semi-final series for the Dominion senior hockey championship against Hamilton Majors, Ontario champions. The series opens here tomorrow night with the second in Toronto Wednesday and the third here Saturday.

Survivors of the set will oppose Quebec Aces or Glace Bay Miners in the Eastern Canada final.

To replace Bauer, Touhey called on young George (Jud) Snell of Winnipeg, last year with Sweden Millionaires of the Cape Breton Amateur League. Snell joined Flyers Feb. 25 after starting with the R.C.A.F. No. 2 "Morning Depot" team at Brandon, Man., and will partner centre Milt Schmitt and left wing Woody Dumart, the other members of the Kraut Line, as a new forward unit.
