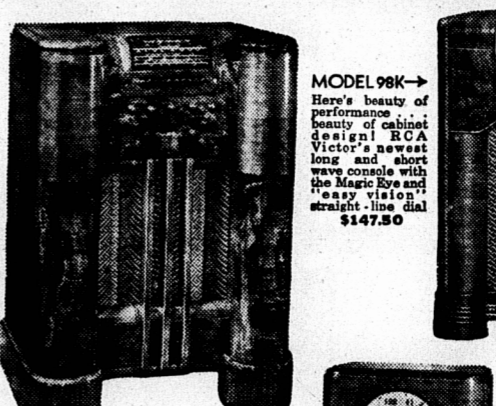

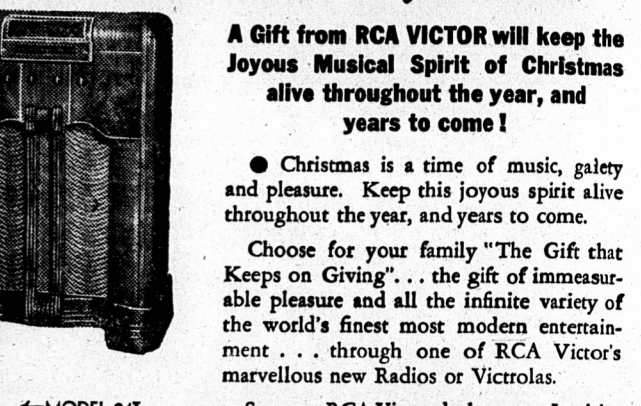

Department is needed. The committee comprises Dr. John Phair, Chief Medical Officer for Ontario; Dr. M. E. Bow, Deputy Minister of Health for Alberta; Dr. F. W. Jackson, Deputy Minister of Health and Public Welfare for Manitoba; Dr. P. S. Campbell, Chief Health Officer for Nova Scotia; and Dr. R. D. BOILERS SHOULD GET TWO DRAININGS

When a boiler sustains the heating plant of a house, before being placed into operation for the winter it should be drained, refilled and drained a second time. A check should be made of all dampers, and all moving parts should be oiled.

Flue connections into the chimney should be removed and any accumulated soot cleaned out. The operation of safety valves and pressure gauge should be carefully checked.
