This morning was altogether taken up by the amendment to the Grain Act, framed in accordance with the report of the committee on agriculture. The Minister of Trade and Commerce, the Hon. James Malcolm, explained in committee the purpose of the new act and the conditions which had led the committee unanimously to make the recommendations which they did.

The Hon. Mr. Bennett stated that as the desire of the Conservative opposition was to see that the producers should get the full value of their production, and as the committee had been unanimously in the conclusions arrived at after hearing all the interests involved, his party would do the utmost possible to expedite the carrying of the bill. For which statements he was applauded by the Liberals and Progressives.

The Hon. Dr. Manion however, vigorously protested the clause permitting the grain commissioners to select their own headquarters, which had formerly been at Port William. In the discussion which followed the opinion was expressed by the minister and others that Port William would not suffer by any action that the commission might take in this respect.

An amendment, which was supported by the Conservatives, was moved by Dr. Manion, resolved that the headquarters should not be selected by the commission, but should be at Port William or Port Arthur. The bill was finally passed. Another amendment was moved by a Progressive and voted down.
