Announcement to this effect was made at the annual meeting of Lipton Limited by Sir John Ferguson, banker, who became financial director and deputy chairman of the company fifteen months ago.

Mr. Patterson has made a host of friends during his short stay in this city and is very much impressed with its scenic beauty and well kept streets and lawns. He leaves for Halifax on Monday enroute to England.

Famous Wrestler Gives Interesting Interview

An interesting figure in the athletic world is at present in the city in the person of Mr. John Patterson, of Victoria, B. C., heavyweight wrestling champion of the Dominion, mention of which was made in these columns quite recently.

Mr. Patterson is a man of excellent personal appearance and in an interview with a Guardian representative yesterday, revealed an interesting history, of which no other man in his profession in the world can boast.

Of Swedish-Scottish descent, John Patterson was born in Victoria, B. C., where he has made his home ever since, and although he has travelled extensively, has never considered the idea of adopting any other country as his, and is proud of the fact that he is a true Canadian.

Patterson has engaged in 1892, wrestling bouts during his career and from 1913 to 1920 while touring of the United States had met many of the present day champions. He won the Fox Gold Cup in a great tournament staged in New York City in 1920 and was a member of the All-American Wrestling team which toured the Orient for several years, visiting India, China, Japan and many other countries in the Eastern Hemisphere. Among the present day wrestling champions he has "strangled" Lewis, Joe Stetcher, and as far back as 1914 he had a bout with Frank Gotch, the famous world's champion of that time. He won the decision over Jack Taylor former heavyweight champion of the world and has been in grips with Sam Calhoun, English heavyweight champion whom he will wrestle again some time during the latter part of this month or early in August, the bout to take place in London, England, and the winner will receive a large purse. He has wrestled in every state in the Union, every province of the Dominion, excepting Nova Scotia, and Prince Edward Island. (His two recent matches here were only of an exhibition variety.) He has also wrestled in every country in Europe, and gave an exhibition of the science in Jerusalem.

Mr. Patterson although an almost perfect specimen of man, physically, his mind is not muscle bound and talked of world affairs with great fluency and knowledge.

At 16 years of age and started the wrestling game when he was mere strapping of 14 years, he was then a graduate of high school and attended Oldfield College, Minnesota.

It may also be interesting to note that Patterson was the man who first discovered Wladek Zyzsko and Jim Landos. It was Zyzsko who then working in the two youths then working in the shoe shining business approached Patterson and said they would like to become wrestlers. Patterson at once being struck with their sturdiness and wonderful physique took them under his wing and taught them the rudiments of the mat game to later develop them into the greatest wrestlers in the world. Both youths weighed less than 155 at the time; both now weigh 200 pounds in condition. Zyzsko was, for awhile heavyweight champion of the world. Landos only recently wrestled Joe Stetcher for the title before the greatest gates in the history of the grappling art; the first gate drew \$33,490 and the second, \$51,000. The first match was a draw and the second a win for Stetcher.

Sport followers will also remember the sensational match between John Piper the second Russian lion and "Strangler" Lewis in 1921, when both men went two gruelling hours on the mat without a fall.

Patterson has the credit for trimming and developing Piper who today is considered the finest specimen of a wrestler in the world. When he began training he weighed only 153 pounds; today he weighs 211 pounds in condition with an arm measurement of 18 1/4 inches; neck, 19 1/4 inches and a normal chest measurement of 51 inches. Piper retired 2 1/2 years ago.

Mr. Patterson won the Canadian title from Jack Taylor in Regina, 1923. Taylor weighed 226 pounds and Patterson 180, a difference of 46 pounds. He has been successfully defending his title ever since.
