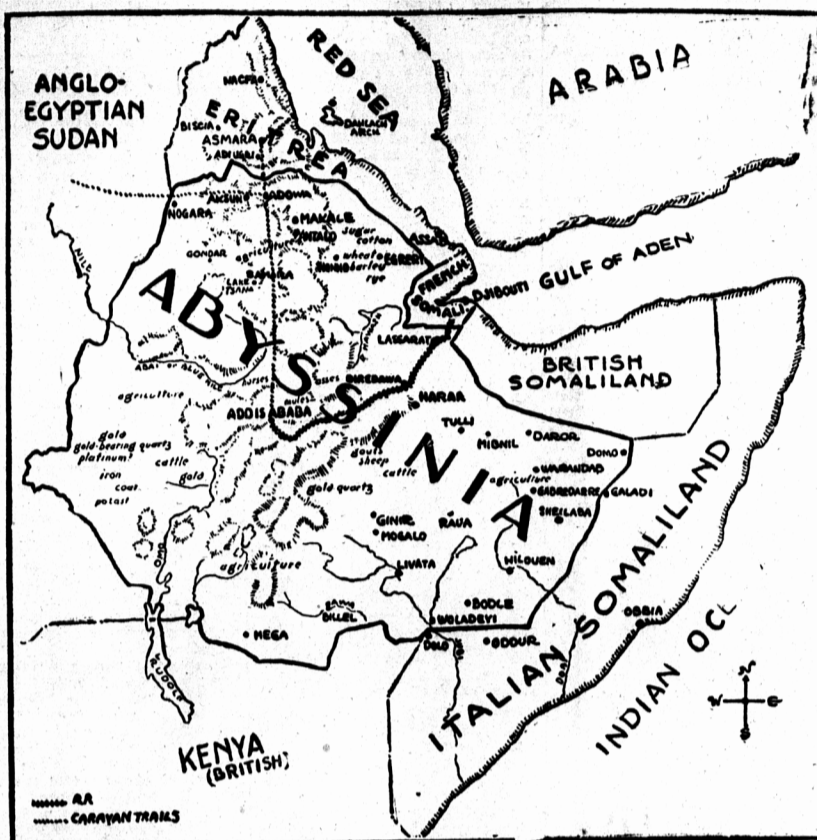

TEACHERS' FEDERATION IN SESSION

Salary Question Discussed at Dominion-wide Gathering.

OTTAWA, August 6.—The average salary of the rural school teacher in Manitoba last year was \$450, Miss Carolyn Parkinson, President of the Manitoba section of the Canadian Teachers' Federation told the 14th annual conference of the organization here today.

On the matter of teachers' salaries, H. C. Rickart of New Brunswick said the collection of these was a serious difficulty. "The country people have felt, and continue to feel the depression most severely. The collectors are lenient to their neighbors, and many take advantage of these conditions."

J. W. Barnett said the salary curve in Alberta had been steadily on the decline since 1929 when the average salary in rural schools was \$1050. It had now dropped to \$739.

Island Woman Shot, Husband Held By Police

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) METHUEN, Mass., Aug. 6.—The name of Delina Ballareon, 40, mother of nine children, shot Sunday during a quarrel with her husband, is all set to swim the channel tomorrow or Thursday if the weather is good.

Police said the husband was told not to enter the house by the front door "because he might let mosquitoes in." Ballareon, after quarreling a while, police said, went upstairs, obtained an old fashioned pistol and returned to the porch and fired upon his wife.

Former Pictou Girl To Swim English Channel

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) DEAL, Eng., Aug. 6.—Eva Morrison, once of Pictou, N.S., now 25-year-old librarian of Boston Hospital, is all set to swim the channel tomorrow or Thursday if the weather is good.

If she postpones her effort beyond Thursday she may have to wait a month for favorable tides. Miss Morrison, who has trained systematically for the big test under the tutelage of the famous channel-swimming "twins," Captain Harry Pearson and Billie Kellingley, expects not only to conquer the rough, choppy waters of the channel easily but to do it in considerably less time than any of her predecessors.

France Expected To Steer Course At Conference

Mussolini Calls Additional Troops To Colors And Orders Officers Of The Classes Of 1909-1914 Report For Training.

LONDON, Aug. 6.—The British Government has decided to let France take the initiative in the tri-power conference in Paris in an effort to find a way to halt an Ethiopian war, it was under stood tonight.

The decision was said to have been made at a conference of Premier Baldwin, Anthony Eden and Sir Samuel Hoare, Foreign Secretary. Eden, Minister for League of Nations Affairs, was given detailed secret instructions for British moves at the conference, which probably will be held early next week.

Premier Baldwin is leaving tomorrow for France on his annual vacation. The Ethiopian Legion here is holding in reserve a list of applications by Englishmen who want to serve with the Ethiopian army in the event of a war.

Charge "Reds" Behind Boycott

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) DETROIT, August 6.—Police investigators looked into a charge today by butchers that Detroit's stormy meat strike is part of a campaign inspired by Communist agitators.

Police Commissioner Heinrich Probert ordered the investigation after the Red charge, raised repeatedly by butchers who say the housewives' militant boycott has resulted in the loss of "bins of meat," was echoed by representatives of Chicago packers who came here to help local dealers.

Officers Training

Later the War Department announced that the classes of 1909-1914 inclusive who have not completed officers' training must begin to do so by November 15, ending the training by May 15, 1936.

It also affects officers now living on pensions who are under the age of 39, and who "still aspire" to readmission into the service.

British Stand Criticized

There were renewed attacks on the press today upon Great Britain because of its attitude toward the Italo-Ethiopian quarrel.

The authoritative writer Virginia Cavada in the Giornale d'Italia said the British military program in East Africa is "inflexible." He attacked both the League and Britain.
