Liner And Schooner In Collision

NEW YORK, N. Y., Jan. 21. - With a rent in her starboard bow 14 feet long and six to eight inches wide, the Clyde liner Cherokee, which collided with the schooner Bright off Barnegate light Wednesday night, returned last night to her pier in the North River.

The collision occurred in a fog shortly after the dinner hour when most of the passengers were in the public rooms or on deck.

The Bright, a five masted schooner loaded with coal, lost her bowsprit. Splinters flying through portholes caused slight injuries to some of the passengers on the liner. Some women fainted but order was restored as soon as the Cherokee was seen to be in no danger of sinking.

The Bright was towed into port by the coastguard cutter Gresham.

French Envoy to U. S. A Fisherman

PARIS, Jan. 24. - The new French ambassador to Washington, Paul Claudel, has one thing in common with President Coolidge and also with his boss back home - Monsieur Briand. He is a fisherman.

M. Claudel's fishing has been more extensive than that of either the president or the French minister of Foreign Affairs. He has fished in the streams that Briand knows, and like Mr. Coolidge, has caught trout in Eastern America.

But he has also caught herring in the Baltic, trout in the streams of the Pyrennes and herring in the cold waters north from Hambourg, not to mention other fish off the Basque coast, the Argentine coast and the waters of the Pacific in China and Japan.

SIR ADAM BECK'S LAST WORK APPLAUDED BY PREMIER COATES

Before leaving for Winnipeg this evening, en route to New Zealand, Rt. Hon. J. Gordon Coates, M. C. and Bar, Prime Minister of the Island Dominion, gave to The Telegram the following appreciation of the late Sir Adam Beck, which was lauded as a result of the trip to Niagara Falls on Sunday.

Mr. Coates said: "In connection with my visit of inspection to the Sir Adam Beck power plants at Niagara on Saturday, I desire to record briefly my appreciation of the splendid service rendered to the Province of Ontario, and also to the Dominion of Canada, by the late Sir Adam Beck, whose energies, and practically his life work, were so signally devoted to the planning and carrying out of this comprehensive scheme of power-production for the benefit of the people of this province. The splendid Hydro plant, which I had the opportunity of seeing at Chippawa and Queenston, is an outstanding monument to the far-sighted vision of Sir Adam Beck, and his name will, I feel sure, be deservedly held in grateful memory by present and future generations."
