Referring to some remarks made by us a couple of weeks ago regarding the alleged "prosperity" of this Province in pre-Confederation days we beg leave to quote some figures from the Census of 1871 to show that the prosperity argument has been greatly exaggerated. The total population in 1871 is given at 94,021, or an increase of some 15,000 more than shown by the census of 1860.

At this point we wish to note that these returns, although a Government enumeration, were pronounced very incomplete at the time, and only goes to show that we were rich in those days in inaccurate statistics.

These are the official figures of our production in 1871 viz: Population 94,021; No. of Farms 14,841; Average No in family 6.31

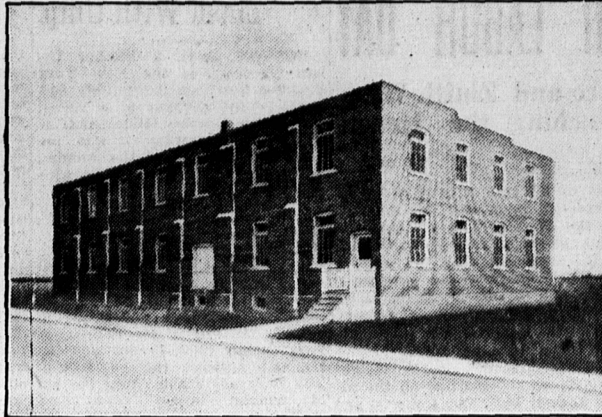

A NATIONAL INDUSTRY

Your attention is called by this announcement to the new Ross-Miller Biscuit Company located at Napanee, Ontario.

Mr. J. K. Ross, the originator of the Imperial Biscuit Co., Charlottetown, has retired from its management and has entered into partnership with Mr. George Miller, expert baker of Toronto, to engage in manufacturing fox and dog biscuit, stock foods, and nutritional biscuit for children and invalids. Recognizing the expansion of the fox business in Eastern Canada and its rapid development all over Western Canada Messrs. Ross and Miller see in it a national industry of great importance and have therefore decided to build a factory at a central point in Ontario. In deciding upon Napanee, Ontario they have picked out a strategic centre for distribution of goods besides being nearer the great Canadian flour mills, Napanee is midway between Montreal and Toronto where the Ottawa junction connects with the main C. N. R. line. It is thus in the very centre of the most populous part of Canada. Cheap labor and hydro-electric power are available at this point. The factory as shown above is a modern brick building 100 by 48 feet and fitted with the latest labor-saving machinery. The revolving oven is one of the largest in Canada, its capacity being 12,000 to 16,000 lbs of flour daily.

A joint stock company is being formed to be known as the Ross-Miller Biscuit Co., Ltd., on the board of which will be some of the most prominent fur farmers of Canada. These gentlemen will form an advisory committee on the

best practical methods of feeding foxes, dogs and other fur bearing animals. The company is fortunate in securing the services of an eminent chemist, Dr. G. W. Morden, M. A., Ph. D. Dr. Ing. a gentleman who has studied chemistry in Europe and has had seven years practical work in the Manitoba Agricultural College in food analysis and animal nutrition. The formulae used in making the biscuit are under his advice and direction. The management of the new company will be under Mr. J. K. Ross who has had ten years experience in manufacturing fox biscuit and is well known as an authority on animal foods. It is the aim of the company to make their product the standard fox and dog Biscuit of Canada as well as a universal food for all fur bearing animals.

Professor A. F. Hansuld recently a teacher of science in Prince of Wales College has become a partner in the Ross-Miller Biscuit Co., and is at present superintendent of the factory. Mr. Hansuld has established a fox farm in Ontario and had a practical knowledge of feeds and feeding.

The management of the Company will be under Mr. Ross who will give his personal attention to publicity and sales management.

The factory is now in full swing turning out from three to four tons of biscuit daily. Two leading wholesale houses have been appointed distributors for this province, Carter and Co., Charlottetown and Brace and MacKay and Co., Summerside.
