TEACHERS UNION.

At the present time when an agitation is being made to secure a salary more in keeping with the work that the teachers of Prince Edward Island are doing it will be interesting to know that their fellow workers of that profession are striving towards the same end in the sister provinces of New Brunswick.

The St. John Globe in referring editorially to a union recently formed in that province says:— "A great many people will sympathize with a movement among the teachers to form a labor union, but will regret some of the details of the scheme. It appears either because teachers are turned out so fast at the Provincial Training School or because of the meanness of trustees in outlying districts, or from both reasons, that first class teachers are in many places paid little better than starvation wages, say less than \$275 for men, and \$150 for women. It is next to impossible to understand how a woman can live on a salary of \$150 a year, even with a government allowance, which might bring it up to \$180, if she is living out of her home. It is to be regretted, therefore, that in fixing their scale the first-class teachers did not make common cause, and abolish any sex distinction. If women undergo the same examination for a license that men undergo and are able to teach the same subjects there is not much reason, if any, why they should not have the same pay. The plan of paying them less than is paid men results in driving men entirely out of the teaching business. Trustees are more likely to employ a woman first-class teacher at \$150 a year than a man at \$275, and no one can reasonably blame them."

THE GREAT SWINDLE. We suppose there are large numbers of people who have been reading continually about the great Humbert swindle and the mysterious Crawford millions without in the least understanding what it has all been about. An exchange has recently come across a graphic description which explains some things but does not explain others. The Humbert swindle began with an old farmer, in poor circumstances called Auguste Daurignac who claimed he had documents in his possession which would one day make his children very rich. The initial question is whether this was a moonshiner, or had any foundation in fact. Whatever it was, a neighbor called Gustav Humbert, a man poor, but of good position, believed it. This man Humbert, afterwards became Minister of Justice in the French government and a life senator. He believed the story to the extent of marrying his son Frederic to Therese Daurignac and agreeing to marry his daughter Alice to her brother. Now that, to begin with was an amazing thing, that a man clever enough to become a cabinet minister and a life senator should enter into a double alliance of this kind under the influence of an old farmer's monomania. The young couple Frederic Humbert and Therese Daurignac were evidently nurtured upon the thought of the mysterious inheritance, but they found little immediate sustenance out of it. They were in great poverty. It was in 1884 that the Humbert swindle began. Madame Humbert invented an American millionaire named Crawford who had left her \$20,000,000. It was indicated that this Crawford had borne a romantic attachment for her mother and that for family reasons the matter had been kept secret up till that time. This, however, was not the sort of story that would impose upon a hard-hearted world in the absence of any signs of cash. So Madame Crawford invented two nephews of this Crawford with whom negotiations and finally legal proceedings were begun. The fortune in the meantime remained sealed in a safe in Madame Humbert's possession. There was nothing for her to do but to keep the law suit going and expand her credit. Europe was presented with the extraordinary spectacle of a law suit going on in the French courts, with the highest legal talent upon both sides, in which one of the parties was entirely the fictitious creation of the other. From 1888 to 1902 the Humberts discounted \$140,000,000 worth of notes in hauds. They kept annually an amount of about \$8,000,000 in circulation. They lived in great style, entertaining and being entertained by all the chief functionaries of the Republic. When creditors became impatient they were told to wait until the mysterious safe was opened, when the solid foundation of the whole display would be revealed. At last in 1902, after fourteen years, it occurred to one of the creditors to ask the court to open the safe and inspect the treasure. This was done with due pomp and solemnity, when it was discovered that the safe was empty. The Humberts are reputed to have stolen more than \$10,000,000. The penalty inflicted of five years in prison seems ludicrously inadequate. Crawford was an invention and the Crawford nephews were an invention. But was the original mystery out of which the whole swindle was evolved, an invention? Madame Humbert says it was not. Maitre Labori, one of the ablest lawyers in France, says it was not. Auguste Daurignac, the father of Madame Humbert evidently knows or believes something. But the most extraordinary fact is that Humbert, the elder, allied himself with the Daurignac family long before any possibility of utilizing the story to swindle the world could have crossed anyone's mind.
