

# S. D. U. In 2-0 Victory Over Mt. Allison In Intercollegiate Series

SACKVILLE, N. B.—(Special to the Guardian)—A fighting squad of St. Dunstan's University footballers, spearheaded by Mike Hennessey's toe, eked out a 2-0 win over an equally determined band of Mount Allison University rugbists in a hard fought N.B.-P.E.I. intercollegiate football game played here Saturday afternoon.

A 35-yard penalty kick by Hennessey that cleared the left hand goal post by inches at the eight minute mark of the second half gave the Island thirteen their win in a game that saw-sawed for the most part between the 25 yard lines and featured good punting and tackling.

A must game for the Saints if they were to stay in competition for the twin-province title, and the championship game for Mount A. If they won, the battle was a natural. Both squads featured crack scrums with fair running, hard tackling backfields.

For the Garnet and Gold it was the scrappy little picking quarter, Warner who led the pack. Bob Barret was effective with his accurate and timely kicking.

Mount A. pressed into S. D. U. territory following the kick off in the first half but were held at bay by the stubborn S. D. U. defense. Kicking by Hennessey and a beautiful piece of broken field running by Ayers brought the pigskin back to centre field three weeks ago.

Play see-sawed back and forth with the Mount A. scrum outthelming the Saints forwards, only to see their half-liners brought down by the tackling Saints. Pete Dunphy, tricky S. D. U. picking quarter almost made it, losing the ball as he fell over the line.

The other scoring threat of the half saw Dunstan Murphy, after gathering in a Mount A. return kick, run from centre field to the Mount A. three-yard line through a maze of players. He passed to Dunphy who could only advance a yard before being smothered by Mount A. defenders.

Saints pressed hard at the start of the second half but couldn't break through the Mounties stone-wall defense. Saints were awarded a penalty kick on the Mounties 35 but elected to keep the ball in play instead of try for the bar.

The second penalty kick awarded to the Saints was on the Mounties 25 about 30 yards from the centre of the goal posts. Hennessey made no mistake as he booted the ball in through for the two points and the ball game.

Although the Saints scrum outthelmed the Mounties from this point on Garnet and Gold pressed into the territory of the Irish on several scoring attempts. Their last three came on a half line run at the 27-minute mark but was snuffed out by vicious tackles by Bun Callaghan and Willie MacDonald.
