The highest temperature recorded yesterday was thirty eight degrees above zero and the coldest was thirty-seven above up till nine p. m. The coldest recorded the previous night was thirty-six above.

At the Police Court in this City yesterday two prohibition cases came up before the Magistrate. The first, against H. Mutch, was adjourned until Saturday for judgment and the other, against Arthur Kenny, was adjourned until Monday.

They were taken before the court at Alberton and sent up for trial.—Moncton Times, Nov 30.
