MR. ASQUITH AND HIS PARTY

conduct of the war. I cannot describe to you in adequate terms how strongly I feel that it is the duty of all of us at this time to avoid anything in the nature of recrimination. If there have been misunderstandings, let us bury them. Whatever differences of opinion we may have, either as to the past or as to the future, let us give each and all the credit, as I do without any reservation, for the best motives and the most single-minded desire to serve the country and carry on the war, and let us, above all, each of us do whatever he can, whether by speech or by action, by hearty co-operation to facilitate the task which is before the country now. That is my hope, that is my desire, that is my intention, and I trust it is yours. (Cheers.)

Viscount Grey having spoken, Mr. Eugene Wason moved the following resolution:

That this meeting records its thanks to Mr. Asquith for his long and magnificent services to the nation, its unabated confidence in him as leader of the Liberal Party, and its determination to give support to the King's Government engaged in the effective prosecution of the war.

Lord d'Abernon seconded the resolution which was carried unanimously. Mr. Asquith, in the course of his reply, said, that so far as he was concerned and was responsible for it, the Opposition would be conducted with a whole hearted and single-minded desire to help, and not to hinder, those who were charged with, and had the supreme responsibility for the prosecution of the war.
