THE MANITOBA SCHOOL QUESTION AGAIN.

Most readers of mature years remember the Manitoba school question which shook the Dominion from centre to circumference in the nineties of last century. Its distant reverberations even awoke some echoes in the Parliament at Ottawa during the recent session and the reading public were told from day to day that the French Canadian contingent were going into revolt against Premier Borden because he would not guarantee them separate schools in the new territory to be added to Manitoba. But when the division came the Premier stood his ground and there were only four or five "bolters" from the ranks.

Much was said of the "sunny ways" of Sir Wilfrid Laurier when he and his followers in 1896 were able to defeat Sir Charles Tupper and his remedial bill, which would have forced a separate school system upon Manitoba. But Sir Wilfrid knew what he was doing and by a tactful agreement with Premier Greenway, and later on in shaping the constitutions of Alberta and Saskatchewan, was able to keep the greater part of his Quebec following in line. It now appears that Premier Borden has been also playing the game of sunny ways, and like Sir Wilfrid, he has done it with the aid of a friendly and supporting Government at Winnipeg. But it seems that the trouble is not yet over at the provincial end.

The rumpus that was raised at Ottawa last winter quieted down with a rather mysterious suddenness. The kickers were told to wait and see what Premier Roblin would do, and

they waited accordingly. Now Premier Roblin is doing things and the excitement which cooled down at Ottawa is rapidly rising to torrid heat in Winnipeg. In a word the Manitoba Minister of Education has introduced sundry amendments to the schools act, which amendments are variously interpreted.

These amendments are three in number. The first is a new interpretation of the word "school," to mean any school room, whether separate or one of a number of rooms in the same building. The second amendment requires that school accommodation must be found for all children of school age, and the third provision is that where there are forty children of Roman Catholic parents they shall be separated from the remainder of the children and have a teacher of their own faith.

At this distance and having the right to frame our school system to suit ourselves, most people will be content to allow Manitoba to do the same, and we could not prevent it if we would. But there seems likely to be no small stir over these amendments in the prairie Province. On the one hand the Catholic minority are not satisfied and on the other hand the Orangemen are protesting. The Liberal Winnipeg Tribune raises the cry of "Traitors!" and reminds Premier Roblin that he is "interfering with the Manitoba school settlement," which dug the grave of several Governments, and which shook the Dominion to its roots." All of which sounds warlike. Fortunately Winnipeg is about twice as far away as Ottawa.

A FAVORITE RESORT.

A very popular walk, judging by the large numbers who frequent it, is that to and across Hillsboro Bridge. On Sundays and holidays, there are thousands who enjoy an outing in that direction. In the summer time, on almost any fine evening, there are hundreds who stroll out to the bridge, to get the fresh breeze from the water and the broader view afforded from this vantage point, of the harbor, the surrounding country and the city itself. Next to Victoria Park at the other end of the town, the Bridge is the most popular with pedestrians.

These facts are recalled in order to draw the attention of the proper authorities, civic or provincial, that this walk is much depreciated in comfort and value by the want of a continuous sidewalk. We have good sidewalks in the city now, and there is a good walk on the embankment and the bridge. Between these comes the break where there is a plenty of mud and no sidewalk. This break is in a small way not unlike the Straits of Northumberland in our winter communication with the mainland. It has given rise to a loud call for a "continuous sidewalk." Pedestrians complain that in taking a walk from the center of the town to the further end of the bridge, a distance of say a mile, they are compelled to encumber themselves with rubbers all the way in order to get over the

muddy "break."
This could easily be remedied. It ought at once to be made right. We have a new Provincial Government and a new City Government, both of which would like to stand well with the people, and the people small and great, rich and poor all stand ready to give full credit to any authority that will promptly give them easy, convenient and continuous communication with the Bridge. The Guardian, too, will give due credit, where ever it shall be due, for the good work when it is done.

A NOVEL ELECTION.

Saint John is engaged in electing its new Commission Government. Where complete it will consist of five men—a Mayor and four Commissioners. These are to be paid good sound salaries and devote their entire time to the city's business, taking the place of the Mayor and Aldermen who formed the old City Council. Two elections are required, a primary election and a final one. The first was held on Tuesday last. The final election, two weeks later, will be between the two candidates who polled the most votes at the primary election for the office of Mayor, and the eight candidates who stood highest in the primary poll for Commissioners.

A citizens ticket was formed by the promoters of the commission movement and this ticket led in the vote at the primary for Commissioners, but its candidate for Mayor was

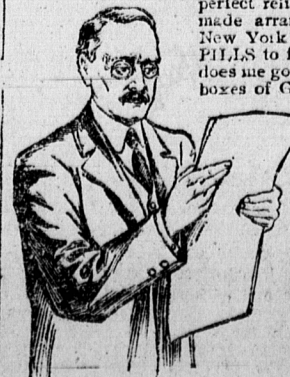
