The schooner Brilliant leaves this morning for Canso. She has been loaded with a general cargo by Carvell Bros.

The Northumberland arrived in port last night at six forty-five.

A cargo of oil is being discharged at Pownal wharf for Carvell Bros.

Yesterday Andrew Peters, Rustico Road, appeared before J. A. MacDonald, Stipendiary Magistrate for Queen's County and was convicted of a first offence against the prohibition act. He was fined \$100 or three months. This was a case brought on by Inspector Jenkins.

The coldest temperature recorded yesterday was thirty-two degrees above zero and the highest was forty-four above up till nine a.m. At nine a.m. the mercury stood at forty degrees above. The coldest recorded the previous night was thirty-eight above and the highest was fifty above.

Robert Harding passed away, at his home about a mile above Rexton, N. B., on Friday evening, at the advanced age of ninety-three years. Previous to his last illness, which began about a month ago, he enjoyed good health and the use of all his faculties. Mr Harding has been married three times. His last wife, who was Miss McAlmon, survives him, and he also leaves two sons and two daughters in the States and one son Robert at home, and a brother, Joseph Harding, of French River, P. E. I., who was with him when he died.—St John Times.

Although the quantity of P. E. I. produce offering at the wharves at this particular season is not so large as in former years, still there seems to be no need of anxiety on the part of householders, as would be inferred from a report which appeared in a Sydney paper a few days ago. There may be a number of schooners tied up at Island wharves waiting cargoes owing to bad roads, but last week there were nine schooners from one P. E. Island country village alone, (Murray River) discharging potatoes and other farm products at New Glasgow, while in Pictou there was half a dozen vessels discharging similar cargoes at the same time. The prices obtaining at these places, as well as on board the several schooners discharging here, are about the same, viz, 35 cents for potatoes, turnips 30, cabbage 75 cents the dozen, and in some instances lower, beets 50 cents the bushel, carrots 50 and parsnips 60 cents. At the Charlottetown market dealers were paying from 20 to 22 cents for potatoes, and other things in proportion, so that at least people here are not taxed to death for these commodities, neither is there any danger of a famine in any of the above lines.—North Sydney Herald.

Aikens, who has been appointed to duty in connection with the department of temperance and moral reform of the Methodist church in Canada, will resign his pastorate in Amherst at the end of the year, and will then take up his residence in Toronto. He is now in Winnipeg on business in connection with his new duties.—Halifax Herald.
