Alberton Presbyterian Church.

The Induction of the Rev. W. M. Morrison on Friday, July 29th, was followed by the Dedication of the renovated church, and the ninety-sixth anniversary on Sabbath, July 31st; also a congregational social at the Manse on Monday, August 1st. This fourfold event in the life of so historic a church, found all of the activities in a strong and robust condition, prospering spiritually and materially, while looking forward with joyful anticipation to the centennial in 1931.

The Induction sermon was preached by the Rev. Andrew Brown, of Tyne Valley, from the text in John 12:31.

The charges of the Rev. Principal Daniel J. Fraser, D.D., L.L.D., of Montreal Presbyterian College — to the minister, as well as that of the Rev. John K. Fraser, D.D., of Renfrew, Ont., to the people, were unanimously concurred to be par-excellent and it is hoped that they may appear in the local press to the end that all may have an opportunity to read them.

Rev. W. B. Muir, Moderator, and Rev. H. Staver, Clerk of P. E. I. Presbytery, also took part.

At the Dedication Services on Sabbath morning, July 31, 1927, the Rev. D. J. Fraser led the congregation in the solemn act of Dedicating the Church to God, the Father—God the Son, and God the Holy Ghost, to which the congregation responded at the close of each sentence by saying, "To Thee we Dedicate this House." To the last response was added the Alberton Presbyterian Church, as one of the Presbyterian churches, in the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Following the Dedication Principal Fraser preached a sermon that will long be remembered from Psalm 87:6—The Lord shall count when He writeth up the people that this man was born there.

A very attractive little booklet giving the order of service for the Dedication, and a brief historical sketch of the Church's Life and Work from the time of the organization, July 20th, 1831, down to the present time was given to each worshipper on entering as a Souvenir of the 96th anniversary.

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 3.—Pittsburgh's two morning papers, the Post and the Gazette-Times, and two of its three afternoon papers, the Sun and the Chronicle-Telegraph, have been sold by their respective owners, and will be merged into one morning edition to be known as the Post-Gazette, and an afternoon edition under the title of Sun-Telegraph.

William Randolph Hearst, owner of papers in many cities in the United States, was announced today as the purchaser of The Gazette-Times and the Chronicle-Telegraph. The announcement was made by George S. Oliver, president of the newspaper printing company, which published both papers.

The Act of the Twenty-ninth Victoria, chapter twenty-six entitled, "An Act to Incorporate the Minister and Trustees of the Presbyterian Church of Casumpec" shall be and the same is hereby revived and continued in force from the time of the passing hereof until the same is repealed or amended.

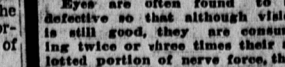
During the past ninety-six years the church has had eight regularly called and inducted ministers—such names as Rev. J. C. Sinclair, Rev. Allan Fraser, Rev. A. F. Carr, and Rev. John Keir Fraser are household words; Alberton knows no prouder names, holds none more dear than theirs.

Among the twelve sons that this church has given to the ministry are to be found the names of George and James Gordon, the noble and martyred missionaries of Bronganga, the Rev. F. J. Larkin, D.D., pastor of the Presbyterian Church, Seaford, Ont., the Rev. J. K. Fraser, D.D., Renfrew, Ont., the Rev. D. J. Fraser, D.D., L.L.D., Principal of Montreal Presbyterian College.

The Alberton Presbyterian church should be filled to capacity next Sabbath evening when the Rev. J. K. Fraser, D.D., will occupy the pulpit.

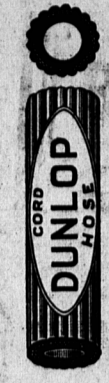

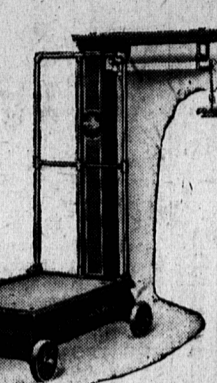

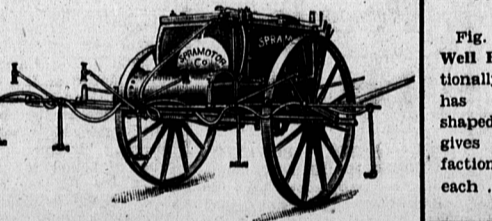


Figure 9 Well Pump

SPRAMOTOR POTATO SPRAYER OUTFIT

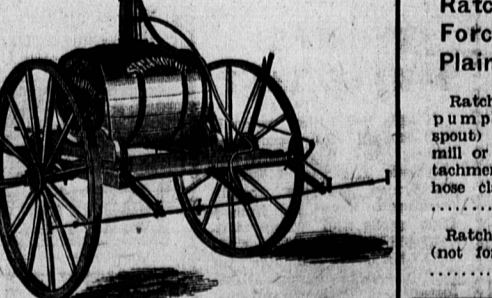
