A Long Distance Telephone Call (Canadian Press) OCEAN FALLS, B. C., Dec. 30. The longest point to point telephone call ever put through between two parties in Canada was made on Christmas Day, when S. C. CIVIC WORKS PRODUCTION UNDERTAKEN IN SWINE DURING YEAR AND SHEEP

Following is a summary of the public works done by the City during 1931.

The Market Square was covered with a pavement consisting of a concrete base and asphalt top. An asphalt top was laid on the inner end of Spring Park Road and the clay part of the street widened and graded.

An asphalt concrete base, asphalt top pavement was laid on Dorchester Street between Great George and Queen Streets. Richmond Street between Rochford and West Streets was paved with concrete base and asphalt top.

A concrete base, asphalt top pavement was laid on Kent Street between Weymouth and Cumberland Streets. A similar pavement was laid at the intersection of Brighton and North River Roads.

There was also work done in connection with the Government under the employment grant including laying pavement on Grafton Street between the railroad crossing and Green Bridge, and the repairs being made to the park breastwork.

In addition to this there was the erection of the new annex to the City Building which was completed several months ago also extensive repairs to the old part of the building.

Council Meets At Summerside

(Special to the Guardian) A special meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held last night. A number of citizens were present at 7:30 the usual hour for the meeting but owing to a lengthy committee meeting the Council did not come into the Council Hall until 8:30.

Councillor Strong, for the Police Department, stated that the disorderly fracas which had occurred recently in the Town had been fully dealt with in the courts and the offenders given heavy fines.

Mayor Lidstone presided and all councillors were present with the exception of Councillor MacNeill who has been granted leave of absence.

Bills were paid amounting to \$3494.50, unpaid bills \$223.35, electric light paid bills \$376.43 and unpaid bills \$911.14 were passed.

An application from Antoine Arsenault for position as janitor was laid over until the next meeting. Several applications for police positions were laid over.

It was moved by Councillor Phillips, and seconded by Councillor Strong that Peter White be appointed as special police officer and that special police officer Jamieson be given two weeks' notice that his services would no longer be required.

Councillor Kelly thanked the Council in general for the splendid support that the Fire Department had received during the year and stated that the equipment was better than ever.

Councillor Grady stated that a lot of taxes had not yet been paid and that several men had made application for work. He hoped that if possible they could be given employment so that their taxes could be paid. The compliments of the season was extended to the Mayor by the Councillors and the meeting adjourned.

Accident Which Ends In Suicide

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, N. Y., Dec. 30. Miss Edna Graham, 22, an unemployed hostess and model, mistook a bottle of poison for cough medicine late today and ran for help to James L. Dobson, who occupied a furnished room in her apartment.

"I've burned my mouth," she cried. "Quick! get me an antidote!" "Never mind that," Dobson answered. "Give me the bottle, I'll finish it for you."

He swallowed the remaining poison and was dead when a physician arrived. Miss Graham meanwhile had been taken to a hospital by a friend. Her condition was said to be not serious.

The police said Dobson, a newspaper steno-typist, had been dis-patched because of his unrequited love for another young woman whose name was not divulged.

Tourist Traffic Shows Increase During The Year

Although there has been general fall of tourist traffic all over Canada during the past year the number of automobiles and autoists coming to this Province during this season has made a substantial increase as is shown by records of the Publicity Bureau. The visitors this year did not remain in the Province as long as other seasons however there was an increase of 204 cars or 5 pc. over last years record for the tourist months. This is credited to the work of the Publicity Association. A still greater increase is shown when the records for the whole season are taken into account as is shown by the following comparative table.

(By the Canadian Press)—Curly-headed Jimmy Creighton, who led Port Arthur's hockey team to the Canadian title in 1929 has been sent to Boston Bruins clubs in the Canadian-American league for a try-out. It was announced tonight by George Hay, playing manager of the Detroit Olympics in the International league, Creighton signed two seasons ago with Olympics but was seriously injured in the midst of his first season.
