### Along The Waterfront

Buntain, Bell's Wharf

The S. S. Chomedy, Captain Seaman, has sailed for Montreal after discharging a cargo of molasses here from Barbadoes, B.W.I.

The S. S. Magnhid, Captain Clausen, which arrived in port early Saturday morning has sailed for St. Pierre and St. John's, Nfld. She took in the following cargo here: 100 head of cattle, 30 horses, 10 tons of hay, 300 bags of potatoes and 200

crates of pigs, after which she also loaded 2,500 bags of potatoes at the railway wharf. The Captain reports having met some heavy ice on the passage from Halifax, which port he had left on Wednesday morning. Upon reaching Canso his ship became jammed and they were compelled to buck the heavy ice field until Friday morning. In order to clear the ice it was found necessary to pursue a course up St. George's Bay and at times being only a half-mile off shore, but after passing Cape George they had clear sailing, with the weather clear and fine.

### U. S. Tennis Players Make Clean Sweep

(A. F. By Guardian's Special Wire) MEXICO, D. F., May 12.—The United States made a clean sweep of its Davis Cup tennis series with China today as Donald Budge of Oakland, Calif., and Bryan M. Grant of Atlanta captured the final two singles matches.

Playing out the full five-match schedule despite the fact the series had been clinched yesterday, Budge whipped Guy Cheng 6-4, 6-2, 6-1 and Grant defeated Sim Kie Kho 6-1, 6-4, 6-3, to make the final score 5-0.

By their victory, the Americans qualified to face Mexico this week in the American Zone finals, the winner to meet the European Zone finalists in the inter-zone finals abroad.

### CANADIAN RETAINS TITLE

(C. F. By Guardian's Special Wire) CINCINNATI, May 12.—Through a storm and under a hot sun, Henry "Hank" Cleman of Toronto, successfully defended his United States Amateur Athletic Union 5,000-meter walking championship today by covering the distance in four hours, 57 minutes.

The Canadian star, in finishing ahead of a field of 71 competitive walkers and 21 recreational walkers over the course of 31 miles, 125 yards belated by one minute his time of last year.

### Cleveland To Seek N.H.L. Franchise

(C. F. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, May 12.—Plans for a new rink at Cleveland to seat 10,000 persons were presented to the semi-annual meeting of the National Hockey League yesterday by A. C. Stuppin, of Cleveland Falcons, of the International League. The rink is expected to be completed by Dec. 1.

Stuppin announced the Falcons would play their home games there next season and the following year would seek a franchise in the National Hockey League.

Request of the International Hockey League for territorial rights in Pittsburg was deferred until a later date with the understanding that if the N. H. L. did not operate a club in Pittsburg next season the I. H. L. would be free to place a team in the Pennsylvania city.

President Charles S. King of the I. H. L., indicated the no-points for the games system, employed by the League last winter, would be abandoned next season.

Suggestion of the Canadian-American League that contracts of referees developed in the minors who graduate to the N. H. L. be purchased by the major league was deferred.
