LOOKS LIKE HIGH POTATOES. — It looks very much as if the consumer is in for a season of high potato prices, says the Maritime Merchant. One merchant who laid in a supply of E. I. Island potatoes for household use at 80 cents, a bushel a short time ago considers now that he was fortunate in view of the turn of affairs are now taking in former years he has paid about 35 or 40 cents. Now it is impossible for the consumer to buy even at 80 cents, the price being firm at \$1.50 per 90 lb. bag.

PICTURES BY CANADIANS.—The illustrations in The Canadian Magazine for December are particularly attractive. Apart from the full page reproductions of pictures by well known painters there are drawings by Dorothy Stevens, who recently won the Canadian Government's travelling scholarship of one thousand dollars, and by Harry W. Meyer, 1. Hubert Leonard, with several excellent war-time pictures by Marion Fogg. The illustrations accompanying Estelle Kerr's article on "Those War-Time Jig-Saw Toys" are novel and decidedly clever. The make-up of the entire number is highly creditable.

HARD TO GET ISLAND OATS. — The situation with respect to oats is about the same as it was a fortnight ago. Practically nothing is being offered from Prince Edward Island and the price on western oats is well maintained. A Halifax commission man was obliged to sell a car of western oats recently to a customer to whom he has in previous years, been in the habit of supplying island oats. The trouble was that he had been trying to get a quotation on island black oats for nearly a month, but unsuccessfully. He was eventually obliged to make the change mentioned in order to give his customer a supply, says the Maritime Merchant.

P. E. I. PRODUCE.—Very few island potatoes are offering in Halifax compared with former years, and those arriving come mainly by steamer or by stamper and fall, and are jobbing at \$1.25 for 90 lb. bags of reds and whites. There are practically no island oats offering, the local supply being practically all Western. However, the same is not true of turnips. One schooner arrived recently with 1500 bushels, and there are others with good supplies. The Maritime correspondent sent The Maritime Merchant the following review of that market a few days ago. Potatoes are moving fairly freely at the present time. The farmers are getting from 55c. to 65c. per bushel for their McIntyres, and about 5c. a bushel less

for reds and whites. The price of McIntyres depends quite a lot on the amount for sale and the quality that is being offered. Private citizens are paying 65c. for best quality for their own use. The small merchant who is buying a few loads to retail through the winter is offering 60c. and selecting his loads on the street. The ordinary buyer's price for export is 55c. but if a farmer can offer a hundred bushels he can make a private arrangement which will give him anywhere up to 60c. and even as high as 65c. The feeling prevails that they will go still higher. The demand for them is very keen. The roads however are bad, making hauling expensive. Turnips are beginning to move freely. The farmers' price at Charlottetown is 15c. a bushel. At Montague and eastern shipping ports they are bringing 20c. They are very few marketed at Summerside and a price has not been established. These last few days very little oats has been moving. The feeling among the farmers is general that the price is not high enough. At present, prices range from 43c. to 45c. for white and from 45c. to 47c. for black. Some of the merchants are putting aside the best oats they get in for seed and are paying a small premium for this quality. There is practically no hay moving. What is changing hands is bringing about \$14 a ton.
