COMMERCIALISM IS RUINING CITY BOWLING LEAGUE OFFIC- BASEBALL. — MANY REASONS IALLY OPENED LAST NIGHT ASCRIBED FOR BALL SCANDAL

NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—During the scandal that broke out just before the recent world's series, which resulted in the expulsion of organized baseball of Cozy Dolan and Jimmy O'Connell, the opinion was expressed that the world's series should be abolished. Bar Johnson, president of the American League, raved that Commissioner Landis should have declared the New York Giants ineligible and substitute the Brooklyn Robins as the opponents of Washington, or that he should have called off the series.

Johnson's views should not be given too much emphasis, however, as there is too much vindictive malice in him and he was talking more as a radical enemy of Landis than as a guardian of baseball. Johnson wasn't such a purist in 1919 and 1920 when one of the teams in his league was involved in a mess and he shouldn't be any more willing to wield the club when a team in another league is involv-

ed. It is an admitted fact that the temptation is becoming great for players of slow mentality and those of loose morals. Temptations are being offered because the game has been so highly commercialized. The club owners are responsible for that.

Instead of charging the highest price for tickets that the public would stand for and instead of grabbing every cent they can get from the players, they ought to give the players reason to believe that there is something in the business except dough.

The money grabbing tactics of the club owners were shown this year when they refused to pay the players for the games played in the world's series. You might argue that it is foolish to suggest that the players should get a regular salary for working for the rich world's series prize, but perhaps the players feel differently about it. DEMPSEY MAY BE A SECOND FOR WALKER

Expect to be Behind Welterweight Champion in Malone Bout.

NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—The possibility of a clash between the winner and Harry Greb, world's middle weight champion, has served to arouse keen interest in the match between Mickey Walker, the world's welterweight title holder, and Jack Malone, which is scheduled to take place in the Newark armory on the night of Oct. 29, under the auspices of the National Sportsmen's Club.

The bout is scheduled to go twelve rounds and while no decision will be involved the battle nevertheless is expected to furnish a good line on the respective chances of the two men against Greb. Particularly will this be true of Walker, who has expressed a desire to try out conclusions with the middleweight champion.

Both Walker and Malone are putting in their hardest training ticks in preparation for the coming battle, and announcement was made yesterday that Walker, who is working out at Rumson, N. J., probably would have Jack Dempsey in his corner on the night of the fight.

Dempsey, who will embark on his vaudeville tour this Sunday, will be playing in Newark the week of the Walker fight and stated yesterday that he expected to make arrangements in order to be with Walker when the latter steps into the ring with Malone.

Willie Harmon, the east side welterweight, and Harry Martone of Jersey will meet in the ten round semi-final, while Nick Ferrara and Gordon Mince, the former national amateur heavyweight champion, will clash in a six.
