

# Detroit Scores 6-4 Win Over Chicago; Boston Downs N.Y. Rangers 5-3

DETROIT, Feb. 2.—(CP)—Detroit Red Wings scored the first four goals, then went on to beat Chicago Black Hawks 6-4 tonight in a National Hockey League clash before 13,421 fans. Detroit's Ted Lindsay scored three goals.

Lindsay's second three-goal performance in his five-year National League career, hoisted his all-time total to 100 goals, just two weeks after Detroit's Sid Abel also reached the 100-goal mark.
