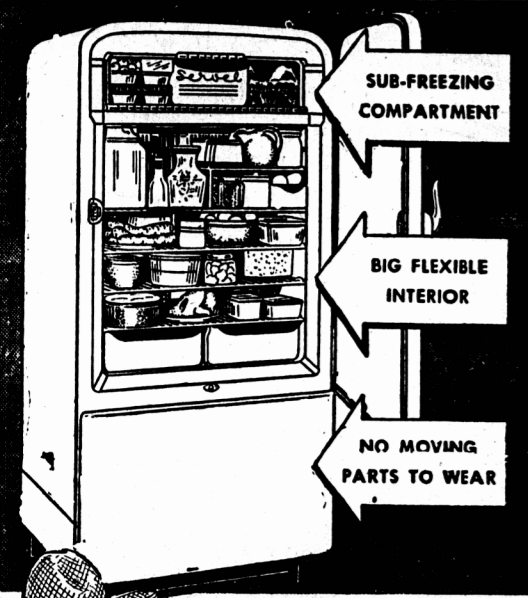
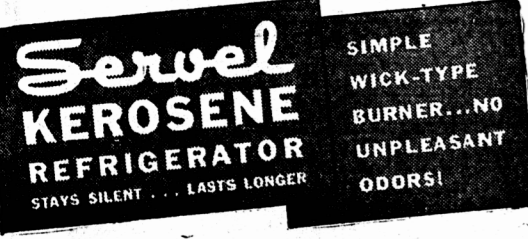

CUTWORM CONTROL FOR CUCUMBERS

The following formulae is recommended for control of cutworms for Cucumbers where large quantities are being grown:

- Bran 25 pounds
- Paris green 1 pound
- Water, about 2 1/2 gallons

Mix the bran and Paris green together thoroughly; then add water until the mixture is of the consistency of wet sawdust. It should crumble in the hand. The bait should be scattered thinly and evenly over the ground (fifteen to twenty pounds per acre) a few days before seeding or transplanting. Cutworms will not feed on cold nights and it is important that the bait be applied only at sundown, following a warm day. If the bait is applied in the daytime, it will dry out quickly and become unpalatable to cutworms. If the cutworms appear after the plants or seedlings are in the field, place a small amount of the poisoned bran (about a teaspoonful) around each plant or scatter the bait lightly along the rows. A second application may be necessary if the cutworms persist; this should be made three or four days after the first.

The president presided. Meeting opened by singing Inslutte Carol followed by repeating Creed in unison.

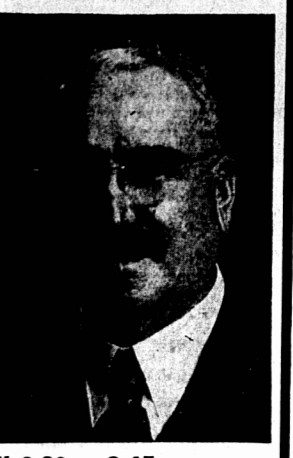
