KINGS COUNTY SEED FAIR AND POULTRY SHOW

On Friday the 27th, the Annual Seed Fair and Poultry Show was held at Souris. The day being favorable the Show proved to be a grand success.

The classes were all well filled; both in seed and poultry. The entries in White Russian Wheat, Old Island Black Oats and McIntyre Potatoes being particularly large and of a very excellent quality, showing great care in selection.

The judging was carried on by Professors Clark Robertson and Davison during the forenoon and the greater part of the afternoon. A feature of the judging was the opportunity given the exhibitors of remaining in the Exhibition building and thereby gaining a great deal of information from the Judges as to their reasons for placing the awards, which will doubtless help the exhibitors in selecting seed in future.

In the afternoon a meeting was held in St. Mary's Hall in connection with the show, and was attended by a large and enthusiastic number of people. Mayor Brennan opened the meeting with a short address in which he extended a cordial welcome to the farmers. Hon. John McLean explained the unavoidable absence of the Commissioner of Agriculture, having to attend a meeting of the Dairyman's Association in Charlottetown. Among the speakers of the afternoon were: Mr. A. L. Fraser, Mr. H. H. Acorn, Rev. Mr. Styles, Mr. J. H. Gill, Father McPherson, Rev. Mr. McIntosh, Mr. T. S. Robertson and Prof. J. A. Clarke. Prof. Clarke complimented the Farmers and Committee on their splendid exhibition saying there was a remarkable improvement in all classes.

It was moved by Mayor Brennan and seconded by T. S. Robertson that a vote of thanks be tendered Professors Clarke, Robertson and Davison, which was unanimously carried.

HON. W. T. WHITE EXPLAINS THE FINANCIAL SITUATION

No Loan Promised to or Asked for by Any Railway Company. Revenues of Dominion Sufficient to Meet all Current and Capital Expenditures.

(From Our Own Reporter)

OTTAWA, Ont., March 1.—An important statement made by Hon. W. T. White to-day completely clears the air in regard to the financial situation. There has been no application for a loan from the Canadian Northern Railway and in addition none is expected. Mr. White's words were as follows: "No application for aid by way of loan has been or is expected to be received by the Government from any company."

This statement is taken to mean that if any aid is given to the C. N. R., it will not be by way of a loan. A cash subsidy is still more unlikely so that in that case the best Mackenzie and Mann apparently could possibly expect would be the guarantee of bonds.

Mr. White also gave a most emphatic denial to the rumor in a number

of papers that there was to be a further issue later on for the purpose of making a loan to a railway corporation. The Finance Minister said the proceeds of the new issue being made in London at the present time would, after the redemption of one million pounds treasury bills maturing in March, be ample to meet all balances payable.

The Finance Minister said that the revenues of the Dominion would be sufficient to meet all current and capital expenditures for the present fiscal year ending March 31st next. The borrowing of the Dominion in London during the last six months, and including the present issue, had been necessary for the following special purposes:

1. To meet sterling and currency maturities in October and November last year, amounting to ten million

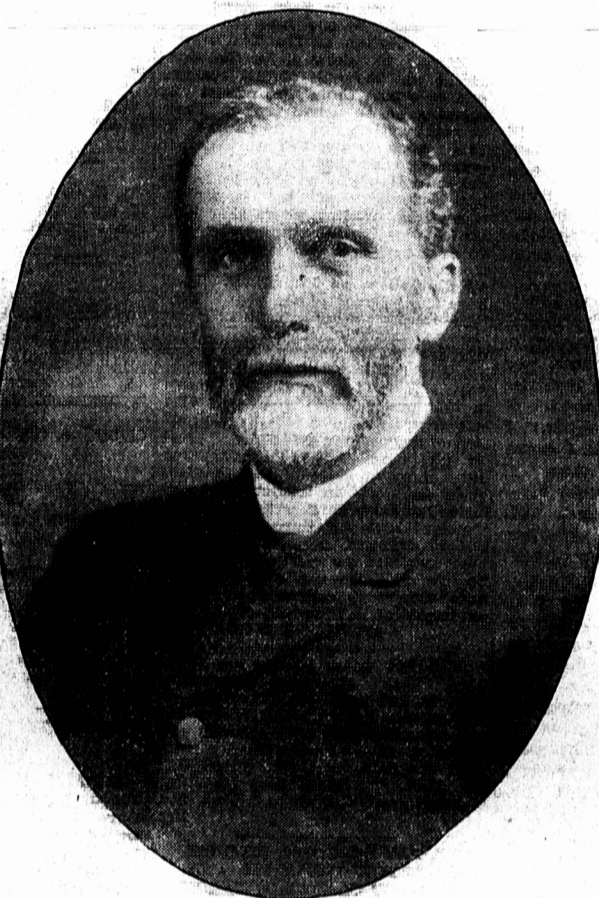
dollars.

2. To pay the special subsidies to the Canadian Northern Railway Company under last year's legislation.

3. To purchase three per cent. bonds of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company guaranteed by the Dominion Government which otherwise would from time to time have been issued by the railway company on the London market. The proceeds of these bonds had been and were being devoted to the construction of the mountain section of the railway.

4. To make the loan to the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company under the guarantee of the Grand Trunk Railway Company, authorized by the legislation of last session.

The guaranteed bonds and the Grand Trunk Pacific referred to become assets in the Dominion Treasury.

BURNED TO DEATH AT TRYON

TRYON, Feb. 28.—Mrs. George Oakes, a widowed lady, aged 60, was burned to death here last night. She was alone in the house at the time, her daughter, with whom she resided, being at church. Mr. Hillier, a resident, was passing the house when he was attracted by screams and on rushing in he found her enveloped in flames, which he extinguished by rolling a mat around her body, but she passed away almost immediately. It is thought that the fire started from a lamp, fragments of which were found on the floor, but it is not known whether it exploded or was let fall by Mrs. Oakes. The clothing was considerably burned but the body had escaped serious injury. Death was brought about by the shock. Deceased was a daughter of the late John Bynon, formerly of Tryon and was a highly respected resident, who is deeply mourned by the community. There are left to mourn two daughters and several brothers and sisters. The funeral took place on Saturday afternoon to Westmoreland cemetery.

LORD MINTO DEAD GOVERNOR GENERAL FROM 1898 TO 1904

(Canadian Press) LONDON, March 1.—Lord Minto, former Governor General of Canada, is dead.

Gilbert John Elliott, fourth Earl of Minto, had a remarkable and adventurous career. He will be remembered chiefly for the distinguished services he rendered as Governor General of Canada and Viceroy of India. Born July 9, 1845, and educated at Eton and Cambridge, taking the B. A. degree, he early gained a reputation as an athlete and a bold and skillful horseman.

The spirit Lord Minto showed in sport blazed up almost fiercely in more serious business. Joining the Scots Guards in 1867 he only remained three years with the regiment, finding that greater excitement was to be had elsewhere, though his career while with the corps was far from uneventful. He was in Paris during the Communist outbreak of 1871 when he made himself conspicuous on the side of law and order. Three years later he acted as correspondent of the "Morning Post," with the Carling army in Biscay and Navarre. Another three years having passed he went to Turkey at the outbreak of the Russo-Turkish war, and was the first to make it known in England that the Russian troops had crossed the Balkans. Accompanying the Turks he was present at the bombardment of Nikopolis and the crossing of the Danube.

On the outbreak of the Afghan war in 1878 he joined Lord Roberts, with whom he remained until the conclusion of peace, when he went to Simla. There he was asked to accompany the Cavaghari mission to Kabul in order to carry a dispatch to the Russian port at Samarkand. Fortunately for him, the idea was abandoned and he thereby escaped the massacre of the mission. In 1881 he was with Lord Roberts again, accompanying him to the Cape as private secretary. The following

year saw him in Egypt as a captain in the mounted infantry. Wounded in the first action, he nevertheless rejoined his corps in a few weeks, and held the command until it was disbanded.

Having seen service in Europe, Asia and Africa, he next came to America, as military secretary to Lord Lansdowne, then Governor-General of Canada. The Nile expedition having been decided on, Lord Minto, as he then was, was asked to raise a body of three hundred footmen and take command of them. The first part of the request he complied with, but was unable to accede to the second. Remaining in Canada he accompanied Gen. Middleton as chief of the staff on the expedition sent to quell the third Riel Rebellion in 1885. This was the end of his active military service.

Lord Minto succeeded to his title on the death of his father in 1891. Seven years later he returned to Canada as Governor-General, succeeding the Earl of Aberdeen. The six years during which he acted as Governor-General were eventful ones for Canada, whether viewed with regard to internal development or imperial relations. They covered a period of prosperity unexampled in its previous history. The trade and revenue of the country increased by leaps and bounds. An immense tide of immigration began to pour into the west, vastly increasing food production in that fertile region and so feeding the railway systems and stimulating industry of every kind from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

Upon the expiration of his term as Governor General of Canada Lord Minto returned to England in 1904. The following year he was appointed to succeed Lord Curzon as Viceroy and Governor General of India. He remained in India from 1905 to 1910 and served acceptably both to the great eastern empire and the home government.

MARITIME EXPRESS OFF THE TRACK

NEWCASTLE, N. B., March 1.—The Maritime express went off the track last night at Lake Land, six miles south of Barnaby River. Three cars with eighty passengers went over on their side but no one was hurt. Supt. Fitzmaurice was on the train. There was no agent nor telegraph at Lakeland and Conductor Crockett and Superintendent walked to Barnaby River, in the meantime the train being lost to dispatchers along line. Finally Newcastle office was communicated with from Barnaby River and an auxiliary train ordered from Moncton and Chatham, the train sent after the passengers taking them to Chatham Junction. A Newcastle special brought them as far north as Napsiguit Junction where they were met by another special which passed them on to Montreal. The accident was caused by a broken bar that dropped down and opened a switch sending the train off the track.

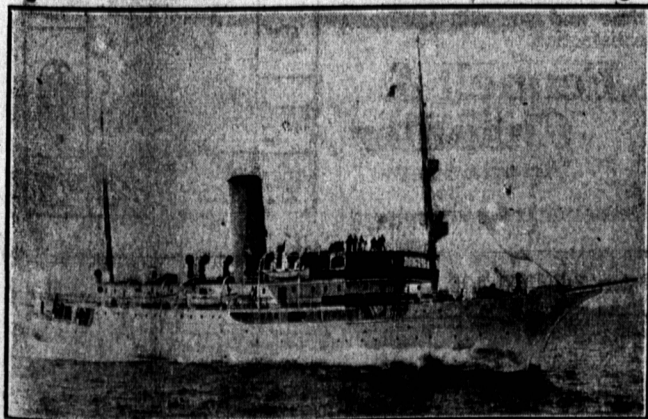

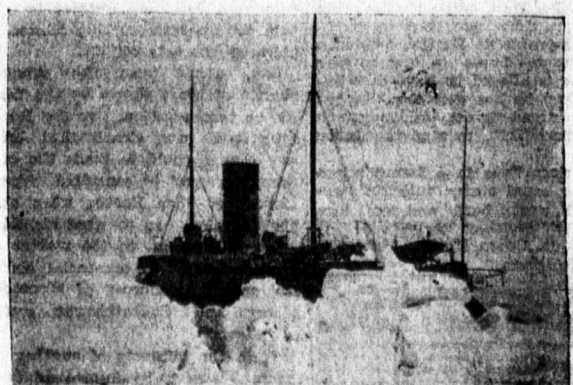
