Woodley presiding and Mr. Fred Irving acting as secretary. The purpose of the meeting was to consider an alteration in the present fishing season. The question was ably debated by Messrs P. M. Arsenault, Michael Howard, Edward McPherson, Roderick McLean, E. A. Arsenault, Maxime Richards, Mathias Gallant, J. G. Arsenault, Thos Allan and others, and a resolution was passed unanimously to the effect that the present lobster season on the north shore should be changed to commence on Aug. 1st and to close on Oct. 1st.
