BIG THREE OF THE YANKS TRIM DETROIT

NEW YORK, June 8.—The Yankees' big three, Babe Ruth, Lou Gehrig and Vernon Gomez, got together today at Detroit to take a close game from the Detroit Tigers, 5 to 4.

Ruth and Gehrig drove in all the New York runs, the Babe hitting his 17th homer in the first inning and Lou providing the winning runs with his 12th four bagger in the seventh. Gomez was in trouble only through wildness. He allowed five hits and fanned 13 but gave nine walks. Billy Rogell hit a homer in the fifth after two men had walked to keep Detroit in the running.

Charlie Berry tripled to centre with the bases filled and two out in the ninth inning at Chicago to give the Chicago White Sox a 3 to 2 victory over Washington and even up the series.

Three Boston pitchers each allowed six safeties as the St. Louis Browns smashed out an 11 to 4 victory over the Red Sox at St. Louis. Jolley knocked out a homer in the third with the bases clear, but Goslin's circuit clout in the same inning scored two ahead of him. Gray, who relieved Herbert in the second held the Red Sox to six hits the rest of the game.

The Cleveland Indians' hopes of beating Lefty Grove after eight straight setbacks in the last two years rose in the seventh inning at Cleveland today when Porter hit a home run but Grove tied the score at 1 - 1 when he caught Harder's first pitch for a hard clout over the right field screen in the eighth. The Athletics finished in front 3 - 1.

THE BRITISH OPEN GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP

SANDWICH, England, June 8.—(Canadian and Associated Press Cables)—Twenty-five Britishers tonight were crowded into the first 27 places at the end of the first round of the British open golf championship.

One point behind the par-breaking 70 of Gene Sarazen, swartly New York Italian, were grouped Percy Allis, finalist in last year's Canadian open, W. H. (Willie) Davies, and Charles Whitcombe, all with five 71's. With them at figure was the perennial Scottish-American contender MacDonald Smith.

As the brilliant play of A. R. Bradder, winner of the qualifying contest, Don Curtis and Ernie McRuvie slipped a little, the old timers forced to the front.

The low 60 scores and ties will continue play tomorrow in the second 18 hole round, and the 36 hole final round Friday.

Sarazen's leading score the first day of championship play was four strokes under par for Prince's long and difficult course.

Bradder, who won the qualifying medal with 70-61-141 needed 76 today, while McRuvie shot a 77 and Curtis a 74.

There was six 73's in the first round of the 72 hole medal play, sixteen 74's and sixteen 75's. Among the latter was Tommy Armour defending champion, another native Scot entered from the United States.

Sarazen went out today in 35 strokes, one under par, and then came back with another 35. Three under par.

Apparently beaten off early in his chance to lead the field, Sarazen came down to the final four holes, the longest and most difficult, needing two birdies and as many pars to get his 70. Par for the stretch is 4-4-5-5 and Sarazen scored 4-4-4-4.

Fighting for every shot, Gene got his 4 at the 15th, and sank an 11 foot putt for his par on the 16th after chipping back too strongly. He reached the green with his brassie on the 516 yard, 17th.

"I've missed his first putt, 25 feet long, but grinned as he tapped in the first birdie.

Then he clinched the lead with a remarkable 4 on the 18th. His tee shot was buried in a pit of deep sand but he pitched out, hammered a long brassie to within 18 feet of the pin, and dropped the putt for the birdie, his 70, and the lead.

CHI. CUBS REGAIN LEAD IN NATIONAL

NEW YORK, June 8. (A.P.)—The Chicago Cubs staged a successful uphill fight today at Brooklyn to defeat Brooklyn 7 to 5 in 14 innings and regain the National League lead from the defeated Boston Braves. Trailing 2-5 at the end of the sixth, the Cubs tied the count in the eighth and Charley Root outpitched Jack Quinn in a six inning duel between relief pitchers. Root allowed only one hit while Quinn weakened in the 14th and three blows, including a triple by Gabby Hartnett and a double by Bill Jurgens brought in the winning runs.

The Phillies won a free swinging contest from the Pittsburgh Pirates 11 to 10 at Philadelphia by putting on a four run rally in the eighth inning.

The Pirates made a counter attack in the ninth when Traynor and Vaughan walked and Dave Barbee hit a home run over the centre field screen. The tying run was on second base when Ray Bengie retired pinch-hitter Douglas for the last out.

The Giants won their second straight game from Cincinnati here 9 to 2, and went into sixth place in the standing, passing the Reds by half a game.

New York combined its ten hits off Eppa Rixey and Larry Benton with four Cincinnati errors in the first four innings to do all its scoring. All nine runs were unearned.

The St. Louis Cardinals at Boston came out of their batting slump and captured the series opener by pounding four Boston pitchers for 20 hits and a 15-8 victory in a world game that lasted almost three hours.

The defeat pushed the Braves into second place in the league standing, the Cubs regaining the lead with a 14 inning victory over Brooklyn.
