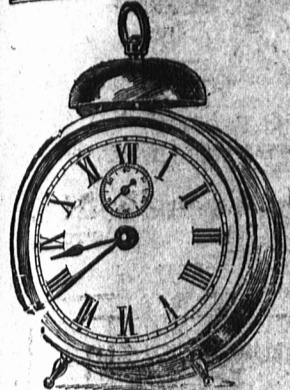

The weather conditions have not yet settled in giving the steamer Minto an opportunity to escape from her ice fetters, and it is fairly easy when the heavy ice pack which fills the Straits, will break up. Most of the passengers have now left the steamer. Forty-one landed on Pictou Island on Wednesday afternoon, and had intended a sailing from that place for Wood Islands on the Island shore, yesterday morning. But as the weather was unfavorable, a north east snow storm prevailing almost all day it is taken for granted that they will not leave and are still on Pictou Island. The steamer Stanley, which has been trying for the past two days to get away from Georgetown to St. John's, has had to return having been unable to accomplish very little in the way of sailing. Although officially nothing seems to have been heard of the steamer which left the Minto on Tuesday, the facts as published in the Guardian tell us what actually occurred.

He leaves three of his family to mourn the loss of a kind father, viz. Mrs. Roseau, of Lynn, Mass., who came to attend him during his last illness, and Mrs. George Leslie of Souris West, as well as Nelson Fairchild, his son, residing in Georgetown. He was a member of Trinity Church and belonged to the Masonic Order.

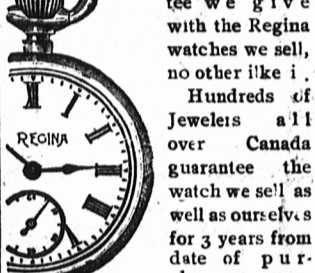
