MILITIA REMOVED.

PORT ARTHUR, Ont., August 1.—Believing that the Canadian Northern and the city police can handle the situation, which has been very quiet since the hostilities of Monday evening, the militiamen were yesterday afternoon withdrawn from the scene of the coal docks strike trouble.

The chief of police and the other wounded men are reported from the hospitals as making good progress towards recovery.

But the things are quite the strike against the coal docks company seems to be quite effective, as all work is suspended and unless something can be done by the company to commence operations soon it looks as there would be something in the nature of a blockade. The steamers Wainwright, Parks and Hebbard, three of the largest lake carriers, are held up at the docks with big cargoes and no one to unload them. Vessels now en route will probably have their destinations changed to Port William, Duluth, or Superior.

CRUELTY TO LOBSTERS.

PHILADELPHIA, August 1.—J. Hardecusau, chief in a well known local cafe, was up before a justice magistrate today charged with cruelty to a lobster, but as Philadelphia lawyers could not decide whether a lobster can be cruelly treated, the judge held the case over until August court, when experts will be called to enlighten the magistrate on that point. The charge was made by an agent of the women's society for the prevention of cruelty to animals, because the chief placed a wood peg or spike in the first joint back of the claw of a lobster on exhibition in the window of the cafe. According to the lawyer engaged by the chief to defend him the spiking of lobsters, is common practice to keep them from snapping.

When the case was called today, the magistrate first decided that a lobster was not an animal and that there was no law against cruelty to lobsters. There was a warm argument and the result was the magistrate will ask experts to help him when the case is taken up again.

BYRCE TO RETURN.

LONDON, Aug. 1.—Asked today in the house of commons by Sir Clement Kinloch Cooke whether the resignation of James R. Bryce, British ambassador to the United States, was impending and whether his successor had been appointed, Sir Edward Grey, secretary of state for foreign relations, replied: Mr Bryce is returning to Washington, and will be ready in September to resume his work there as ambassador.
